### Fall 2023 offerings

First Flight had several camp offerings for the fall of 2023. Students could register for all camps they were interested in, but were only charged one \$10 fee for the program itself.

Here is a look at what was offered this fall:

### **Catch With The Cardinals**

Girls in kindergarten, first and second grade worked with the Cardinals' high school players and coaches to work on the fundamentals of throwing and catching. Students were also introduced at a home softball game.

### **Girls Volleyball**

Girls in first through six grade are being instructed in the basics of volley-ball in a fun environment. A variety of age appropriate games are incorporated into the instruction. Optional 4 vs 4

home tournaments also available for first and second graders, and optional weekend tournament games in Lincoln or Omaha available for third through sixth grade girls.

### Flag Football Fundamentals

Students in third and fourth grade get to be instructed in the fundamentals of throwing, catching and blocking. Some of the basic Crete High School plays and formations will be taught. Students will progress to competing in Flag Football Scrimmages.

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# Intermediate School honored nationally

rete Intermediate School is one of only 100 schools in the nation to be honored last year as a National ESEA Distinguished School.

The award, presented by the National Association of ESEA State Program Administrators, recognizes Crete Intermediate for exceptional student achievement in 2022.

Crete Intermediate was honored in Category 3, excellence in serving special populations of students.

"It is an honor to be recognized as a Distinguished School serving special populations," Principal Lisa Fye said. "Our staff works relentlessly to carry out our school's vision: Where students want to be, staff choose to work and families want to connect."

Dr. Josh McDowell, Crete Public Schools superintendent, said this honor is a recognition of the work put in by everyone at the school.

"The entire Crete Intermediate School staff has bought into the process and has been dedicated to each student," McDowell said. "We are so proud of this staff for their hard work on behalf of students and their families."

Crete Intermediate serves 414 students in third through fifth grades.

Fye said the school ensures that students feel safe and ready to learn. The school uses a system that allows students to communicate what they need to be successful throughout the day.

Students who receive English language and special education services are supported through Tier 1 instruction, she said.

"Anyone walking through our halls can see, hear and feel the collaboration of our staff as they embrace challenges with positivity and determination," Fye said. "The community recognizes the supportive environment we've worked so hard to establish. It's what makes our school special."

Established in 1996, the National ESEA Distinguished Schools Program recognizes qualifying federally funded schools for the outstanding academic achievements of their students.

The Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA) provides additional resources for vulnerable students and federal grants to state educational agencies to improve the quality of public elementary and secondary schools.

# **Cardinal Academies: The future of CHS**

re we preparing students with the career and skill sets needed for their future? To answer this question, Crete Public Schools brought together teachers, employers and community leaders, transforming their high school to make learning more meaningful and give students the skills they need to be ready for what comes next.

This transformation resulted in the Cardinal Academies Crete. The Cardinal Academies will provide all students with more of the advanced skills they need to be successful, productive citizens in college, career and life.

### So what is an academy?

A career academy is a small, safe and supportive learning environment that is contained within a larger high school setting. An academy has a career and college theme preparing students for both post-secondary schooling and work. Nationally, it has three major components:

- A small learning community (SLC) is a group of students within the larger school that takes classes together and is taught by a team of teachers from different disciplines.
- A career theme within a college prep curriculum enables students to see relationships and connections between academic subjects and their application to a broad field of work.
- Community engagement includes partnerships with employers, the community and colleges, bringing resources from outside the high school to improve

student motivation and achievement.

### How does an academy work?

All ninth-grade students will take Freshman Seminar. In this class, they will spend time discovering the different pathways we will offer. At the conclusion of their freshman year, they will list their top three choices and be assigned to a pathway to explore over the next three years. Pathways are like college majors; students choose which to pursue based on their interests.

During their sophomore, junior and senior years, students will explore learning opportunities and be immersed in college and career preparatory programs through a focused lens of instruction. At the conclusion of their

final year, students will have developed a senior capstone project to culminate their pathway learning experiences.

### What will be the outcomes?

Transition to the academies will result in:

- Increased graduation rates
- Increased daily attendance rates
- Increased student achievement
- Students invested in the community
- Fewer discipline incidents
- Higher ACT scores
- Improved teacher efficacy




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


### **Reward Jars**




### **Quick Bullet Rundown**

- Homecoming Dance for WC students grades 9-12 was Saturday, October 7th.






