


















Klooz: Experiences help shape class of '25

Many of you don't really know me. I've heard assumptions about me that just aren't true from classmates, parents, and even teachers. These assumptions have changed how people thought of and treated me, often negatively impacting both their behavior and my quality of life. I personally know others who have had much worse experiences as a result of incorrect judgments, and I believe it's upsetting for anyone to have untrue things said about them and believed.

I'm not here to sugarcoat, reminisce, or to reflect on the past and all of the memories we had in high school. The memories you have are for you to do with as you wish. Cherish them, hold them close, learn from them, and use them to push you towards your next goals. I'm here because I want to inspire improvement in all of us for what comes next.

years here at Wilber, I've learned a lot of things. One of those things is just how cruel people are to each other. I've seen how harsh and how judgmental people can be. (Myself included. None of this speech excludes me, because I'm a flawed person.) Everyone complains about school – even the students that enjoy learning dislike some aspect of it. Often, that's the social aspect. Why is that?

I believe it's because of judgment. We ALL have judged each other. When I first arrived here in my freshman year, I was totally convinced Kevin was a senior. I don't know why I thought this, but I did, and I was scared to ask otherwise. But as a consequence – and as a very shy person - I was intimidated by him and too nervous to interact. This was an incorrect judgment I made about him, because Kevin

has been a wonderful and supportive friend for me throughout all of my high school years.

What if I had avoided him this whole time because I was too intimidated by him? I would have missed out on a meaningful friendship for the past three years. What if all of us have wrongfully judged someone and ended up missing out on a person that could have become a reliable neighbor, an important connection, or even our closest friend?
