

Mountain View native receives Emmy Award for costume work

Working as a costume supervisor in New Orleans has been a perfect fit for Mountain View native Elizabeth Macey, whose talent and hard work were rewarded recently with one of her industry's top prizes.

Macey won a 2014 Emmy Award – Outstanding Costumes For A Miniseries, Movie Or A Special – for her work on the FX series “American Horror Story.”

“It’s very exciting. It’s a thrill,” she told the *Leader* Monday.

Macey did not set out to pursue this type of work. She came to it late, she said, but a combination of her natural talent and being in the right place at the right time has paid off in a rewarding and successful career.

“I just kind of fell into this line of work,” Macey explained.

A 1989 graduate of Mountain View High School, she moved to New Orleans in 1995 with no idea of becoming involved in the television industry. She is self-taught and had no special education or training in costume design, but she was always interested in clothing. She was drawn to New Orleans simply because she loved the city, with its creative and theatrical community.

“My mom bought me a sewing machine for Christmas, and through trial and error, I taught myself to sew,” she said.

Louisiana was one of the first states to pass tax incentives attracting film and TV productions, about 15 years ago, and it has been second only to California in the number of productions that are filmed there, Macey said. Many other states followed, but Louisiana was especially well suited for the industry because of the large creative work force

already in place surrounding New Orleans's theater industry.

Macey fit right in and has found the city and the industry well suited to her interests and talents.

“I took to it, and it took to me.”

Macey joined a union for theatrical stage employees and got her start professionally by designing and building costumes for Mardi Gras “Indians” – revelers who dress for Mardi Gras in suits influenced by Native American ceremonial apparel.

Before joining the staff of “American Horror Story,” she also worked on a children's program called “Imagination Movers” and HBO's “Treme,” a post-Katrina drama set in New

Orleans and named for one of its neighborhoods.

She began coordinating the costume department while working on “Treme” and now occupies a similar position as costume supervisor on “American Horror Story.”

Macey oversees labor in the costume department, attends meetings about each episode of the show, and reviews the scripts to determine what costumes will be needed and any special needs of the characters. She also sees to fittings and sourcing of the cos-

tumes. This includes renting, buying, altering, and in some cases creating the clothing worn by characters on the show.

“American Horror Story” is an unusual program, as each season tells a complete story, and the settings, characters, and even time periods change, though some of the actors (such as Jessica Lange) reappear each season as different characters. It is classified as a miniseries because of this format, and every season includes flashbacks to other historic periods. Macey has had the opportunity to dress characters for the 1800s, 1920s, and 1950s, as well as in modern settings.

“I enjoy all that,” she said.

In the season for which the Emmy was awarded, titled “Coven,” the show had a contemporary setting but included flashbacks to 1830s New Orleans. It featured historic characters such as Voodoo Queen Marie Laveau and Delphine LaLaurie, a socialite infamous for killing and torturing slaves (played by Kathy Bates).

The current season, “Freak Show,” is in production. It is also filming in New Orleans and focuses on a 1950 circus-style sideshow that is one of the last of its kind, as people with physical abnormalities were increasingly placed in asylums at that time, Macey said.

This has presented interesting costume challenges.

“We’re fitting the tallest woman in the world and the shortest woman, and a woman who has no legs,” Macey said. Some

“We’ve always earned our living with our craft,” Linda said.

Charles has been in the craft business 48 years, beginning as a woodcarver, and the couple have been mar-

ried for 35 years.

“Best 35 years of my life,” Charles said. “Nothing good ever came until she came along.”

Linda, who is a native of Stone County, learned woodcarving from Charles and then began making wooden jewelry, which led her to develop the style of metal and stone jewelry that she is still making today.

“She just had a natural talent, which she turned into skills, a very bright lady,” Charles said. He noted that he and Linda have collaborated on many projects over the years, and he is thankful for their working relationship.

“I never thought about living this long,” Freeze said. He said he didn't do anything special to live to be 100, just worked hard throughout his life.

Freeze has lived his entire life in Stone County and grew up at Bickle's Cove. He said the biggest changes he has seen are the roads and transportation. He explained the highways are now blacktop and are no longer dirt and gravel. He said when he was growing up there weren't many cars, and his family rode to town in a wagon.

He also remembers when people started talking about TVs before they were available in Stone County. He said TVs were described as a radio

with pictures.

Over the years, Freeze has worked in the timber, at saw mills, in farming, and drilling water wells.

His biggest hobby and enjoyment through his long life has been dancing. He remembers dancing nearly every night for several years at the courtsquare.

Freeze was the fourth child out of four brothers and two sisters. He has outlived all of his siblings except his younger brother, Ralph, who is 90 years old and rooms with him at the Stone County Nursing and Rehabilitation Center.

Freeze also outlived both of his wives. He was married to Neva (Sutton) Freeze for 57 years, and married to Cora Lee (Cooper) Freeze for 20 years.

Freeze has one daughter, Bonnie McMurray, several

of the regular principal actors are also using prosthetics to alter their physical form.

Macey, whose title is "costume supervisor," is one of three people named on the Emmy Award, along with Costume Designer Lou Eyrich and Assistant Costume Designer Ken Van Duyne.

Macey said she is fortunate to work with designer Eyrich, who allows everyone on the team a chance to be creative. She also commended her entire staff

for their part in the achievement. The costume department on the show includes up to 20 people, 14 of who work on a daily basis.

"Even though the three of us got the award, it took all of us to get it."

They work hard, she noted, putting in 14-16 hour days, five days a week. This makes it difficult to have much of a life outside the work, but she said it is easy to give a lot when the job is interesting.

"You really have to put everything else on hold and dive into the work," she said.

Though she is thrilled to have won an Emmy, Macey said the fan

response has already been very rewarding. She has been amazed by some of the fan art she has seen that includes extremely detailed replication of the costumes.

"It's a popular show and has a pretty extreme following," she said. "Whether we get an award or not, the fan response was just overwhelming."

The award was presented during the 2014 Creative Arts Emmy Awards in a ceremony held Aug. 16 at the NOKIA Theatre L.A. LIVE in downtown Los Angeles. This first cere-

mony of the 66th Emmy Awards honored guest performers on television dramas and comedy series, as well as the artists and craftspeople behind the scenes.

Other nominees in the costume category were "House of Versace" on Lifetime, "Sherlock: His Last Vow" (Masterpiece) on PBS, HBO's "The Normal Heart," and "The White Queen" on Starz.

"American Horror Story" received a total of 17 Emmy nominations this year. It airs on FX, LIVE in downtown Los Angeles. This first cere-

"I've done my best work since I met her," he said.

The Widmers' popular wire-wrapped jewelry includes a variety of gemstones, coins, beads, and other items, set in sterling silver, 14k gold-filled, or occasionally copper wire (nothing with nickel in it). The type of metal depends on the color of the stone and the desired effect.

Linda particularly likes pearls but works with all kinds of stones and other items.

"I find that I like all of them."

"Just whatever we can find that we want to wrap, she can wrap about anything, a 52 Buick if you got one," Charles said.

Custom pieces are also offered.

"A lot of folks will bring special coins that maybe their grandpa had, and they want a necklace made so they can wear and enjoy it," Linda said.

The Widmers had a store downtown for several years before joining the staff at the Ozark Folk Center, where they have worked for 15 years.

Charles said he enjoys working at Folk Center and interacting with the visitors who come in and out of the shop every day. He said it actually makes him a better artist, as he must concentrate on what he's doing as he's demonstrating it.

Though he does not carve as much anymore, Charles has begun working more with metals in recent years. He makes a line of hand-cast orna-

ments from hand-carved wooden molds that he makes himself. He has about 150 different molds, including traditional holiday shapes, letters, and a variety of more unexpected forms such as dinosaurs and other animals.

He uses Babbitt metal, which is melted and poured into molds, and then cut away, textured and burnished using hand tools.

The Widmers started the jewelry shop at the center, and while it is one of the less tradi-



tional Ozark crafts demonstrated in the state park, it is also one of the most popular. Unlike some crafts that involve

the same process being passed from one crafter to another to create the same product, the Widmers' jewelry is their own creation and design that will likely not be replicated in the future.

"We've been working on this art all of our lives," they said.

The couple used to do a lot of craft shows but now focus mainly on local outlets. They have a display at Sanders Antiques on the square, as well as at the center.

Though the Widmers do a lot of their work in the Folk Center jewelry shop, they have also added a small studio at their home in Mountain View, which will be open to the public for the Studio Tour.

The tour is planned for Sept. 19-21.

Cities where you barely knew your neighbors, community service was something reserved for the overflow residents of the penal institutions, and the local politicians were people that only showed interest in you during the election season. As for experiencing any form of assistance during an emergency, forget it. You could file duplicate, sometimes triplicate, requests for services at the local city administration offices and then wait months for a response that would never come. As for being greeted by any elected official while shopping or driving down the road, it seemed that once elected, they were above speaking to any of their "subjects."

I have the opportunity to interact with Mountain View city officials on occasion, and I have yet to leave any of those meetings without the feeling that "I matter and what I think matters." As for pitching in and helping during this past winter's problems, I can only say "thank you." It's only one of the reasons that I thank God every day for allowing me to live in a community like Mountain View. There have been several emergency situations that we have experienced since

moving here, and I can't recall a time when our city officials didn't step up to the plate and do whatever was needed to make sure the folks of Mountain View were cared for.

But, we elected these folks because a majority of us felt they were capable of carrying out their duties with the moral and business disciplines they displayed during the election process.

The bottom line just might be the "season." Maybe that's why elections are held in the fall. Average bus rides vary widely

Almost 60 percent of Arkansas public school students take the bus to school, and each morning they spend an average of about 49 minutes on the bus, according to an extensive survey by legislative analysts. On average, they spend another 49 minutes riding home.

The survey was required by Act 1288 of 2013. Under the Arkansas Constitution, it is the legislature's duty to provide an adequate and equitable education, and there is research indicating that lengthy student travel time can have a negative effect on students' academic achievement levels. It also can limit their opportunities to participate in extracurricular activities.

The longest average rides are by a few students who spend two hours and 47 minutes on the bus each morning, and the same amount of time on the bus going home. They attend magnet schools in Little Rock but live outside the

district.

The shortest average times on the bus are for a student who gets to school three minutes after boarding the bus.

The most common bus ride is for 45 minutes to and from school. The 50 percent of students who are in the middle range, in other words those between the 25th percentile and the 75th percentile, spend from 35 minutes to an hour on the bus each morning and again on the bus going home.

It's common for districts to stagger the starting time for elementary, middle and high schools to give bus drivers time to drop off young students and then pick up older ones.

There are 238 school districts in Arkansas and they run 5,360 buses. Every day each bus carries an average of 48 students. Every day, Arkansas school buses drive a total of 5,321 miles.

Bus drivers were paid an average of \$9,794 in salary last year.

Over the past 10 years

about 60 percent of the public school students in Arkansas have ridden the bus to school. Last year 59 percent of the 460,000 students rode the bus. That is more than 270,000 students.

Arkansas schools spent \$184 million on transportation costs in Fiscal Year 2013. Those costs include drivers' salaries, financing vehicles and maintenance.

It would require more buses and drivers to reduce the long ride times. It would cost \$2.7 million to limit all bus rides to 90 minutes, and 106 districts would have to add vehicles and drivers. To limit all bus rides to an hour, it would cost \$18.6 million and 124 districts would have to add vehicles and drivers.

The state Lottery Commission projected that in the current fiscal year \$78.2 million will be available for scholarships. In Fiscal 2012 the lottery generated more than \$97 million for scholarships, and in the following two years the total fell to \$90 million and \$81 million.

Lottery experts say that in every state where a lottery is created, revenue tends to decline after a few years because the initial excitement wanes. The legislature has had to reduce scholarship amounts because of declines in lottery ticket sales.

Higher education and lottery officials anticipate that there will be enough money to fund scholarships for all college students whose grades make them eligible this year.

YARB TALES

Elder flowers, berries have many uses

The Heritage Herb Garden at the Ozark Folk Center graces the park with visual colors and textures, sweet and pungent aromas, and helps us to interpret the history of the human use of plants.

A recipe for Elderberry Shrub appeared in last week's column along with a promise to share some of the virtues of the herb. Elder's flowers and ripe berries are so good for human beings, pollinators and our fine-feathered friends.

Tiny flowers are borne in flat-topped, umbrella-shaped cor-

ymbs, in masses - they are cream-colored and sweetly fragrant - some can be as wide across as a dinner plate. Elderflowers appear in our Zone 7 areas in May and last about a week to 10 days. This is a small window in which we have to harvest the blooms for making elderflower cordial and elderflower fritters. We also dry some blooms to make teas and tinctures. However, we do not want to harvest too many flowers, since we want at least as many berries. Besides drying flowers for tea, we quite enjoy

homemade elderflower liqueur. The flowers are mild and astringent and have been used in folk remedies to soften the skin, for inflammation of the eyes, for congestion, headache and indigestion. Elderflowers have been used for tea for centuries and are safe and effective when taken to reduce fevers relating to colds, flu, chicken pox and measles. Note: Michael Moore reports that children with a history of high fevers or convulsions, should avoid the tea since it occasionally can spike

high fevers.

Berries appear in August in our Zone 7 gardens, and we pay attention once they are green and fully filled out. Green, unripe berries are poisonous because they contain prussic acid, the precursor to cyanide. Once they turn purple-black, it is time to gather them before the birds get them. Songbirds and wild animals eat elderberries. Sharing resources is a part of ethical living, especially for the natu-

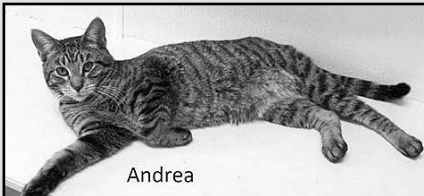

'Paws in Prison' to begin



THE SCOOP

From the Stone Co. Humane Society

The Paws in Prison (PIP) program at North Central Unit will be in full swing again next month. The Stone County Humane Society will select two dogs to go into training at the Calico Rock facility. Dogs will be assessed at the shelter for characteristics that will make them good candidates for the program. Once selected, they will go into training for 8 weeks. During this time they will learn basic obedience commands, become crate and leash trained and be house trained. Dogs also learn the requirements of the Canine Good Citizenship test, which they must pass before graduation.

Every dog has two trainers and lives in a barracks environment with other inmates and other dogs. This setting provides many opportunities for socialization. Trainers assigned to a dog keep a journal noting the animal's progress and personality traits. This journal is given to the adopters at graduation. Adopters are invited to the graduation ceremony and are encouraged to communicate with their dog's trainers.

Trainers often have a difficult time saying goodbye to the animals they have worked with so closely for 8 weeks, but as soon as graduation is over they meet their new dog and start building that special relationship again.

The SCHS has had

great success with the PIP program. Every dog entered into the program has been adopted while still in training. The adopters all share wonderful stories about the new addition to their lives. Most of the animals go into private homes, but one dog has become a service dog in a hospice.

This program is a win win for the dogs, trainers, adopters and the community. The dogs go to loving forever homes, the adopters get an animal that is obedient and fits into their lives, and the community benefits as the number of homeless animals is reduced. The trainers benefit by learning a skill set that could be useful in their rehabili-

tation, and they often share that they like being able to give back to the community through this program.

PIP is supported by private donations and sales of recyclables. Information on PIP dogs can be obtained by choosing the PAWS IN PRISON icon on Arkansas Dept. of Correction's website, adc.arkansas.gov.

Arkansas Forest Commission accepting seedling orders

The Arkansas Forestry Commission (AFC) is currently accepting orders for seedlings that will be available in January for the 2015 planting season. Prices are the same as last year with genetically improved loblolly pine selling for \$45, \$50, and \$60 per 1,000 seedlings and mixed loblolly selling for \$40/1,000.

The Advanced Generation shortleaf pine and containerized shortleaf pine is also available. Improved shortleaf pine has already sold.

Several species of hardwood are still available that are well-suited to the soils and climate of north Arkansas. Species such as black oak, northern red oak, pin oak, sawtooth oak, and white oak are available, along with eight other species of oak. Other non-oak species such as black walnut, pecan, persimmon and redbud are available, along with five other species that are beneficial to wildlife.

Orders are being taken on a first come-first served basis with a limited supply for all seedlings. You may come by the AFC office on Wilcox Street near the airport and pick up an order form or go online to the AFC website at www.forestry.arkansas.gov and click on "2015 Planting Season" and follow the links to the necessary form.

Depending on the weather, seedlings are

usually lifted at the nursery beginning in December or January and are delivered to Mountain View in January or early February. The best time to plant these bare root seedlings is between January and March.

ralist and herbalist. Those of us who are wildcrafters have a duty to leave plenty for everyone. We want to be sure that the berries are fully ripened for making shrub, elder syrup, cordial, jelly and wine. Berries should be cooked before eating.

We also dry some of the berries, so we have them to use in recipes in winter months when we really need their protective virtues for fighting flu and colds. Besides being anti-viral, other healing properties are anti-cancer, anti-inflam-

matory, antimicrobial, cathartic, diuretic, laxative, stimulant and sudorific. Elderberries are nutritious, high in vitamins A and C and antioxidants, and they also contain vitamin B, calcium, iron, niacin and thiamine, and even some protein.

To review the importance of proper identification - if you are going out to harvest elderberries, don't mistakenly gather devil's walking stick, *Aralia spinosa* berries. Devil's walking stick has unmistakable thorns - the berries are tintured for use as a toothache and rheumatism remedy, though they are poisonous if taken in large quantities.

Likewise, be certain to know the difference between the leaves of poison and water hemlock, *Conium maculatum* and *Circuta maculatum*, and elder. Elder grows in wet places where the deadly poisonous hemlocks are found. American elder has grey-brown, woody bark with pithy stems and is a large shrub or small tree. The hemlocks have smooth stems that are green with purple streaks.

Here's to knowing and using elder for pleasure and good health.

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RAISING GRANDCHILDREN CAN BRING TAX BREAKS

In recent years, more and more grandparents have found themselves raising their grandchildren. If you're one of them, you may qualify for one or more of these tax breaks.

- If you're single and caring for a grandchild, you may be able to file your tax return as head of household, which offers lower tax rates than single status. Your grandchild must live with you for over half the year, be under age 19 at year-end (under 24 if a student), and have provided less than one-half of her own support for the year.
- You may also be able to claim your grandchild as a dependent, if you're the one providing more than one-half of her support. This will entitle you to an additional exemption (\$3,950 for 2014) and will also enable you to include her medical and dental expenses when computing your allowable medical deductions.
- If you're working but must pay for your grandchild's care to do so, you may qualify for a credit equal to a percentage of the expenses. Your grandchild must live with you more than half the year and be a dependent, either under age 13 or otherwise unable to care for himself.
- Working grandparents may also be able to claim the earned income credit (EIC). Their grandchild must qualify as a dependent, except he may provide more than half of his own support. More affluent grandparents won't be eligible for this credit, since income restrictions apply.
- Child tax credits are available to most grandparents with dependent grandchildren under age 17. Although income limitations apply, they are less restrictive than those for the EIC.
- Additional tax breaks may be available to grandparents who pay to educate their dependent or otherwise qualifying grandchildren. Contact us for more details about all of these tax-saving opportunities.

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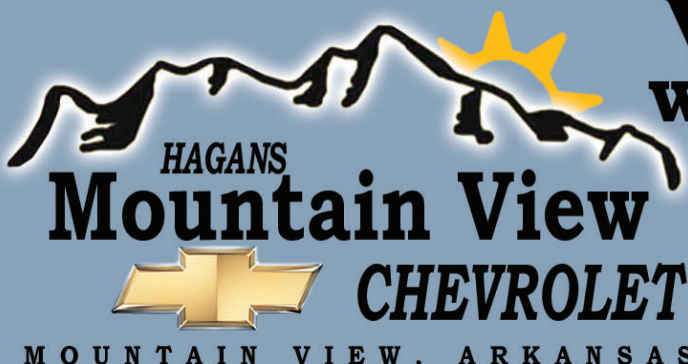

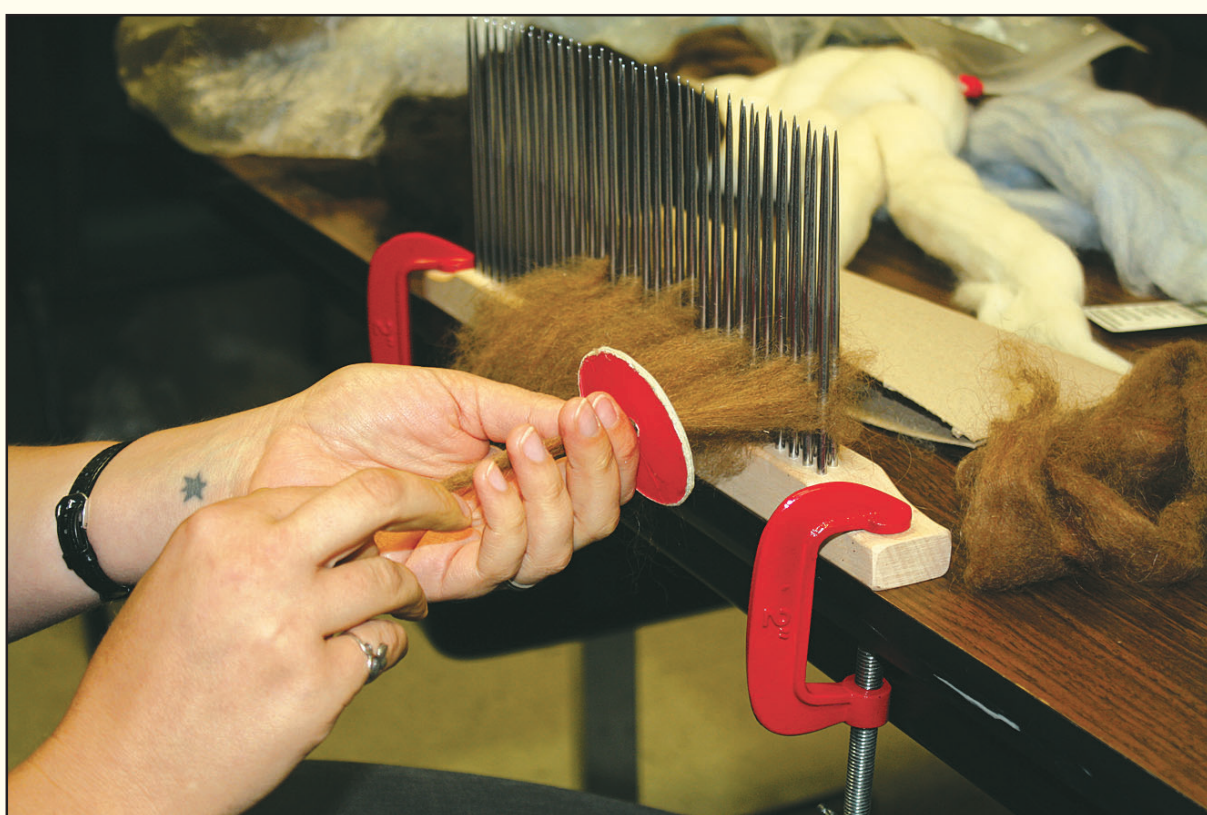
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Fiber Frenzy

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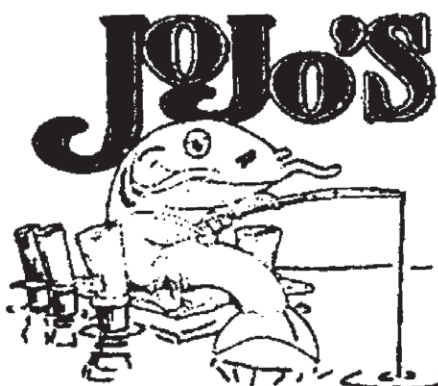

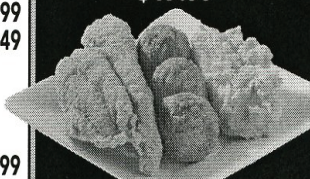

When not fishing his two ponds, or hunting and horseback riding on his ranch, Fuller travels the country attending western heritage festivals.

He will be appearing at the Spirit of the Cowboy Festival in McKinney, Tex., to be held on Sept 12-14 (see www.spiritofthecowboy.net for events).

"This is the third year and it keeps getting bigger," said Fuller of the festival. "All my cowboy buddies - Alex Cord, Jim Drury, Burt Giliham, Bo Hopkins, and many more - will be there."

Fuller's Hollywood career extended over 50 years and he was a popular '60s TV cowboy in "Laramie" and "Wagon Train." In the '70s, he traded his lasso for a suture as Dr. Kelly Brackett in "Emergency" (see www.robertfuller.info).

SECTION 1. Article 5 of the Arkansas Constitution is amended to add an additional section to read as follows:

§ 42. Review and approval of administrative rules.

- (a) The General Assembly may provide by law:
 - (1) For the review by a legislative committee of administrative rules promulgated by a state agency before the administrative rules become effective; and
 - (2) That administrative rules promulgated by a state agency shall not become effective until reviewed and approved by the legislative committee charged by law with the review of administrative rules under subdivision (a)(1) of this section.
- (b) The review and approval by a legislative committee under subsection (a) of this section may occur during the interim or during a regular, special, or fiscal session of the General Assembly.

SECTION 1. The subsection of Article 5, Section 1, of the Arkansas Constitution titled "Amendment of Petition" is amended to read as follows:

- Amendment of Petition. (a)(1) If the Secretary of State, county clerk or city clerk, as the case may be, shall decide any petition to be insufficient, he or she shall without delay notify the sponsors sponsors of such petition, and permit at least thirty (30) days from the date of such notification, in the instance of a state-wide petition, or ten (10) days in the instance of a municipal or county petition, for correction or amendment.
- (2) For a state-wide petition, correction or amendment of an insufficient petition shall be permitted only if the petition contains valid signatures of legal voters equal to:
 - (A) At least seventy-five percent (75%) of the number of state-wide signatures of legal voters required; and
 - (B) At least seventy-five percent (75%) of the required number of signatures of legal voters from each of at least fifteen (15) counties of the state.
- (b) In the event of legal proceedings to prevent giving legal effect to any petition upon any grounds, the burden of proof shall be upon the person or persons attacking the validity of the petition.

TO AMEND THE ARKANSAS CONSTITUTION CONCERNING ELECTED STATE OFFICIALS; PROHIBITING MEMBERS OF THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY AND ELECTED CONSTITUTIONAL OFFICERS OF THE EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT FROM ACCEPTING GIFTS FROM LOBBYISTS, AND DEFINING KEY TERMS RELATING TO THAT PROHIBITION; PROHIBITING MEMBERS OF THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY FROM SETTING THEIR OWN SALARIES AND THE SALARIES OF ELECTED CONSTITUTIONAL OFFICERS OF THE EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT, JUSTICES, AND JUDGES; ESTABLISHING A SEVEN-MEMBER INDEPENDENT CITIZENS COMMISSION TO SET SALARIES FOR MEMBERS OF THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY, ELECTED CONSTITUTIONAL OFFICERS OF THE EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT, JUSTICES, AND JUDGES; ESTABLISHING THE APPOINTMENT PROCESS FOR MEMBERS OF THE INDEPENDENT CITIZENS COMMISSION, AND PROHIBITING MEMBERS OF THE INDEPENDENT CITIZENS COMMISSION FROM ACCEPTING GIFTS FROM LOBBYISTS; PROHIBITING CERTAIN CONTRIBUTIONS, INCLUDING CONTRIBUTIONS BY CORPORATIONS, TO CANDIDATES FOR PUBLIC OFFICE; PROHIBITING A MEMBER OF THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY FROM REGISTERING AS A LOBBYIST UNTIL TWO (2) YEARS AFTER THE EXPIRATION OF HIS OR HER TERM; AND ESTABLISHING TERM LIMITS FOR MEMBERS OF THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE EIGHTY-NINTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ARKANSAS AND BY THE SENATE, A MAJORITY OF ALL MEMBERS ELECTED TO EACH HOUSE AGREEING THERETO:

THAT the following is proposed as an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Arkansas, and upon being submitted to the electors of the state for approval or rejection at the next general election for Representatives and Senators, if a majority of the electors voting thereon at the election adopt the amendment, the amendment shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Arkansas, to wit:

SECTION 1. This amendment shall be known and may be cited as "The Arkansas Elected Officials Ethics, Transparency, and Financial Reform Amendment of 2014".

SECTION 2. Article 19 of the Arkansas Constitution is amended to add additional sections to read as follows:

§ 28. Contributions.

- (a)(1) It is unlawful for a candidate for public office or a person acting on the candidate's behalf to:
 - (A) Accept a contribution from other than:
 - (i) An individual;
 - (ii) A political party that meets the definition of a political party under Arkansas Code § 7-1-101;
 - (iii) A political party that meets the requirements of Arkansas Code § 7-7-205;
 - (iv) A county political party committee;
 - (v) A legislative caucus committee; or
 - (vi) An approved political action committee; or
 - (B) Accept a contribution in excess of the maximum amount allowed by law per election from:
 - (i) An individual;
 - (ii) A political party that meets the definition of a political party under Arkansas Code § 7-1-101;
 - (iii) A political party that meets the requirements of Arkansas Code § 7-7-205;
 - (iv) A county political party committee;
 - (v) A legislative caucus committee; or
 - (vi) An approved political action committee.
- (2) A candidate may accept a contribution or contributions up to the maximum amount allowed by law from a prospective contributor for each election, whether opposed or unopposed.
- (b)(1) It is unlawful for an individual, a political party that meets the definition of a political party under Arkansas Code § 7-1-101, a political party that meets the requirements of Arkansas Code § 7-7-205, a county political party committee, a legislative caucus committee, or an approved political action committee to make a contribution to a candidate for public office, or to a person acting on the candidate's behalf, that in the aggregate exceeds the maximum amount allowed by law.
- (2) The following entities may make a contribution or contributions up to the maximum amount allowed by law to a candidate, whether opposed or unopposed, for each election:
 - (A) An individual;
 - (B) A political party that meets the definition of a political party under Arkansas Code § 7-1-101;
 - (C) A political party that meets the requirements of Arkansas Code § 7-7-205;
 - (D) A county political party committee;
 - (E) A legislative caucus committee; or
 - (F) An approved political action committee.
- (c) As used in this section:
 - (1)(A) "Approved political action committee" means any person that:
 - (i) Receives contributions from one (1) or more persons in order to make contributions to a candidate, ballot question committee, legislative question committee, political party, county political party committee, or other political action committee;
 - (ii) Does not accept any contribution or cumulative contributions in excess of five thousand dollars (\$5,000) from any person in any calendar year; and
 - (iii) Registers pursuant to Arkansas Code § 7-6-215 prior to making contributions.
 - (B) "Approved political action committee" does not include an organized political party as defined in § 7-1-101, a county political party committee, the candidate's own campaign committee, an exploratory committee, or a ballot question committee or legislative question committee as defined in § 7-9-402;
 - (2) "Candidate" means an individual who has knowingly and willingly taken affirmative action, including solicitation of funds, for the purpose of seeking nomination for or election to any public office;
 - (3)(A) "Contribution" or "contributions" means, whether direct or indirect, advances, deposits, or transfers of funds, contracts, or obligations, whether or not legally enforceable, payments, gifts, subscriptions, assessments, payment for services, dues, advancements, forbearance, loans, or pledges or promises of money or anything of value, whether or not legally enforceable, to a candidate, committee, or holder of elective office made for the purpose of influencing the nomination or election of any candidate.
 - (B)(i) "Contribution" or "contributions" includes the purchase of tickets for events such as dinners, luncheons, rallies, and similar fundraising events; the granting of discounts or rebates by television and radio stations and newspapers not extended on an equal basis to all candidates for the same office; and any payments for the services of any person serving as an agent of a candidate or committee by a person other than the candidate or committee or persons whose expenditures the candidates or committee must report under Arkansas law.
 - (ii) "Contribution" or "contributions" further includes any transfer of anything of value received by a committee from another committee.
 - (C) "Contribution" or "contributions" does not include noncompensated, nonreimbursed, volunteer personal services or travel;
 - (4) "County political party committee" means a person that:
 - (A) Is organized at the county level for the purpose of supporting its affiliate party and making contributions;
 - (B) Is recognized by an organized political party, as defined in Arkansas Code § 7-1-101, as being affiliated with that political party;
 - (C) Receives contributions from one (1) or more persons in order to make contributions to a candidate, ballot question committee, legislative question committee, political party, political action committee, or other county political party committee;
 - (D) Does not accept any contribution or cumulative contributions in excess of five thousand dollars (\$5,000) from any person in any calendar year; and
 - (E) Registers pursuant to Arkansas Code § 7-6-226 prior to making contributions;
 - (5)(A) "Election" means each election held to nominate or elect a candidate to any public office, including school elections.
 - (B) For the purposes of this section, a preferential primary, a general primary, a special election, and a general election shall each constitute a separate election;
 - (6) "Expenditure" or "expenditures" means a purchase, payment, distribution, gift, loan, or advance of money or anything of value, and a contract, promise, or agreement to make an expenditure, made for the purpose of influencing the nomination or election of any candidate;
 - (7)(A) "Exploratory committee" means a person that receives contributions which are held to be transferred to the campaign of a single candidate in an election.
 - (B) "Exploratory committee" does not include:
 - (i) A political party;
 - (a) That meets the definition of a political party under Arkansas Code § 7-1-101; or
 - (b) A political party that meets the requirements of Arkansas Code § 7-7-205; or
 - (ii) The candidate's own campaign committee;

(8)(A) "Legislative caucus committee" means a person that is composed exclusively of members of the General Assembly, that elects or appoints officers and recognizes identified legislators as members of the organization, and that exists for research and other support of policy development and interests that the membership hold in common.

(B) "Legislative caucus committee" includes, but is not limited to, a political party caucus of the General Assembly, the Senate, or the House of Representatives.

(C) An organization whose only nonlegislator members are the Lieutenant Governor or the Governor is a "legislative caucus committee" for the purposes of this section.

(9)(A) "Person" means any individual, proprietorship, firm, partnership, joint venture, syndicate, labor union, business trust, company, corporation, association, committee, or any other organization or group of persons acting in concert.

(B) "Person" includes:

- (i) A political party that meets the definition of a political party under Arkansas Code § 7-1-101 or a political party that meets the requirements of Arkansas Code § 7-7-205;
- (ii) A county political party committee; and
- (iii) A legislative caucus committee; and

(10) "Public office" means an office created by or under authority of the laws of the State of Arkansas or of a subdivision thereof that is filled by the voters, except a federal office.

(d)(1) A person who knowingly violates this section is guilty of a Class A misdemeanor.

(2) In addition to the penalty under subdivision (d)(1) of this section, the General Assembly shall provide by law for this section to be under the jurisdiction of the Arkansas Ethics Commission, including without limitation authorization of the following actions by the Arkansas Ethics Commission:

- (A) Promulgating reasonable rules to implement and administer this section as necessary;
 - (B) Issuing advisory opinions and guidelines on the requirements of this section; and
 - (C) Investigating complaints of alleged violations of this section and rendering findings and disciplinary action for such complaints.
- (e)(1) Except as provided in subdivision (e)(2) of this section, the General Assembly, in the same manner as required for amendment of laws initiated by the people, may amend this section so long as such amendments are germane to this section and consistent with its policy and purposes.
- (2) The General Assembly may amend subsection (d) of this section by a majority vote of each house.

§ 29. Registration as a lobbyist by a former member of the General Assembly.

- (a) A former member of the General Assembly shall not be eligible to be registered as a lobbyist under Arkansas Code § 21-8-601 et seq. until two (2) years after the expiration of the term of office for which he or she was elected.
- (b) Subsection (a) of this section applies to all persons elected or reelected to the General Assembly on or after November 4, 2014.
- (c)(1) A person who knowingly violates this section is guilty of a Class D felony.
- (2) In addition to the penalty under subdivision (c)(1) of this section, the General Assembly shall provide by law for this section to be under the jurisdiction of the Arkansas Ethics Commission, including without limitation authorization of the following actions by the Arkansas Ethics Commission:
 - (A) Promulgating reasonable rules to implement and administer this section as necessary;
 - (B) Issuing advisory opinions and guidelines on the requirements of this section; and
 - (C) Investigating complaints of alleged violations of this section and rendering findings and disciplinary action for such complaints.
- (d)(1) Except as provided in subdivision (d)(2) of this section, the General Assembly, in the same manner as required for amendment of laws initiated by the people, may amend this section so long as such amendments are germane to this section and consistent with its policy and purposes.
- (2) The General Assembly may amend subsection (c) of this section by a majority vote of each house.

§ 30. Gifts from lobbyists.

- (a) Persons elected or appointed to the following offices shall not knowingly or willfully solicit or accept a gift from a lobbyist, a person acting on behalf of a lobbyist, or a person employing or contracting with a lobbyist:
 - (1) Governor;
 - (2) Lieutenant Governor;
 - (3) Secretary of State;
 - (4) Treasurer of State;
 - (5) Auditor of State;
 - (6) Attorney General;
 - (7) Commissioner of State Lands;
 - (8) Member of the General Assembly; and
 - (9) Member of the independent citizens commission for the purpose of setting salaries of elected constitutional officers of the executive department, members of the General Assembly, justices, and judges under Article 19, § 31, of this Constitution.
- (b) As used in this section:
 - (1)(A) "Administrative action" means a decision on, or proposal, consideration, or making of a rule, regulation, ratemaking proceeding, or policy action by a governmental body.
 - (B) "Administrative action" does not include ministerial action;
 - (2)(A) "Gift" means any payment, entertainment, advance, services, or anything of value, unless consideration of equal or greater value has been given therefor.
 - (B) "Gift" does not include:
 - (i)(a) Informational material such as books, reports, pamphlets, calendars, or periodicals informing a person elected or appointed to an office under subsection (a) of this section regarding his or her official duties.
 - (b) Payments for travel or reimbursement for any expenses are not informational material;
 - (ii) Gifts that are not used and which, within thirty (30) days after receipt, are returned to the donor;
 - (iii) Gifts from the spouse, child, parent, grandparent, grandchild, brother, sister, parent-in-law, brother-in-law, sister-in-law, nephew, niece, aunt, uncle, or first cousin of a person elected or appointed to an office under subsection (a) of this section, or the spouse of any of these persons, unless the person is acting as an agent or intermediary for any person not covered by this subdivision (b)(2)(B)(iii);
 - (iv) Anything of value that is readily available to the general public at no cost;
 - (v) Food or drink available at a planned activity to which a specific governmental body is invited;
 - (vi) Payments by regional or national organizations for travel to regional or national conferences at which the State of Arkansas is requested to be represented by a person or persons elected or appointed to an office under subsection (a) of this section;
 - (vii) Campaign contributions; and
 - (viii) Any devise or inheritance;
 - (3) "Governmental body" or "governmental bodies" means an office, department, commission, council, board, committee, legislative body, agency, or other establishment of the executive, judicial, or legislative branch of the state, municipality, county, school district, improvement district, or any political district or subdivision thereof;
 - (4)(A) "Income" means any money or anything of value received or to be received as a claim for future services, whether in the form of a retainer, fee, salary, expense, allowance, forbearance, forgiveness, interest, dividend, royalty, rent, or any other form of recompense or any combination thereof.
 - (B) "Income" includes a payment made under obligation for services or other value received;
 - (5) "Legislative action" means introduction, sponsorship, consideration, debate, amendment, passage, defeat, approval, veto, or any other official action or nonaction on any bill, ordinance, law, resolution, amendment, nomination, appointment, report, or other matter pending or proposed before a committee or house of the General Assembly, a quorum court, or a city council or board of directors of a municipality;
 - (6) "Legislator" means a person who is a member of the General Assembly, a quorum court of a county, or the city council or board of directors of a municipality;
 - (7) "Lobbying" means communicating directly or soliciting others to communicate with a public servant with the purpose of influencing legislative action or administrative action;
 - (8) "Lobbyist" means a person who:
 - (A) Receives income or reimbursement in a combined amount of four hundred dollars (\$400) or more in a calendar quarter for lobbying one (1) or more governmental bodies;
 - (B) Expends four hundred dollars (\$400) or more in a calendar quarter for lobbying one (1) or more governmental bodies, excluding the cost of personal travel, lodging, meals, or dues; or
 - (C) Expends four hundred dollars (\$400) or more in a calendar quarter, including postage, for the express purpose of soliciting others to communicate with a public servant to influence any legislative action or administrative action of one (1) or more governmental bodies

unless the communication has been filed with the Secretary of State or the communication has been published in the news media. If the communication is filed with the Secretary of State, the filing shall include the approximate number of recipients.

(9)(A) "Person" means a business, individual, union, association, firm, committee, club, or other organization or group of persons.

(B) As used in subdivision (b)(9)(A) of this section, "business" includes without limitation a corporation, partnership, sole proprietorship, firm, enterprise, franchise, association, organization, self-employed individual, receivership, trust, or any legal entity through which business is conducted.

(10)(A) "Public appointee" means an individual who is appointed to a governmental body.

(B) "Public appointee" does not include an individual appointed to an elective office.

(11)(A) "Public employee" means an individual who is employed by a governmental body or who is appointed to serve a governmental body.

(B) "Public employee" does not include a public official or a public appointee.

(12) "Public official" means a legislator or any other person holding an elective office of any governmental body, whether elected or appointed to the office, and shall include such persons during the time period between the date they were elected and the date they took office; and

(13) "Public servant" means all public officials, public employees, and public appointees.

(c)(1) A person who knowingly violates this section is guilty of a Class B misdemeanor.

(2) In addition to the penalty under subdivision (c)(1) of this section, the General Assembly shall provide by law for this section to be under the jurisdiction of the Arkansas Ethics Commission, including without limitation authorization of the following actions by the Arkansas Ethics Commission:

(A) Promulgating reasonable rules to implement and administer this section as necessary.

(B) Issuing advisory opinions and guidelines on the requirements of this section; and

(C) Investigating complaints of alleged violations of this section and rendering findings and disciplinary action for such complaints.

(d)(1) Except as provided in subdivision (d)(2) of this section, the General Assembly, in the same manner as required for amendment of laws initiated by the people, may amend this section so long as such amendments are germane to this section and consistent with its policy and purposes.

(2) The General Assembly may amend subsection (c) of this section by a majority vote of each house.

§ 31. Independent citizens commission.

(a) As provided in this section, members of the General Assembly shall have no authority to set salaries for:

(1) Their positions as members of the General Assembly;

(2) Elected constitutional officers of the executive department;

(3) Justices; and

(4) Judges.

(b)(1) There is created an independent citizens commission for the purpose of setting salaries of elected constitutional officers of the executive department, members of the General Assembly, justices, and judges as provided in this section.

(2)(A) Each member of the independent citizens commission shall serve a term of four (4) years.

(B) A person shall not serve more than two (2) terms on the independent citizens commission.

(3) The independent citizens commission shall consist of seven (7) members as follows:

(A) Two (2) members appointed by the Governor;

(B) Two (2) members appointed by the President Pro Tempore of the Senate;

(C) Two (2) members appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives; and

(D) One (1) member appointed by the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court.

(4) Vacancies on the independent citizens commission shall be filled in the manner of the original appointment.

(5) The independent citizens commission shall elect from its membership:

(A) A chair; and

(B) Other officers deemed necessary by the independent citizens commission.

(6) Four (4) members of the independent citizens commission shall constitute a quorum for the purpose of transacting business.

(7) A majority vote of the total membership of the independent citizens commission is required for any action of the independent citizens commission.

(8) The office of the Auditor of State shall provide staff assistance as may be requested by the independent citizens commission.

(c)(1) In making appointments to the independent citizens commission, the Governor, the President Pro Tempore of the Senate, the Speaker of the House of Representatives, and the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court shall consider racial, gender, and geographical diversity.

(2) A member of the independent citizens commission shall be:

(A) A citizen of the United States;

(B) A resident of the State of Arkansas for at least two (2) years preceding his or her appointment;

(C) A qualified elector; and

(D) At least twenty-five (25) years of age.

(3) The following persons shall not serve on the independent citizens commission:

(A) A person holding civil office;

(B) An employee of the State of Arkansas;

(C) A person required by law to register as a lobbyist; or

(D)(i) An immediate family member of:

(a) A person holding civil office;

(b) An employee of the State of Arkansas; or

(c) A person required by law to register as a lobbyist.

(ii) As used in subdivision (c)(3)(D)(i) of this section, "immediate family member" means a person's spouse, a child of the person or spouse, a child's spouse, a parent of the person or the spouse, a brother or sister of the person or the spouse, anyone living or residing in the same residence or household with the person or the spouse, or anyone acting or serving as an agent of the person.

(d) The independent citizens commission shall have the duty to review and adjust as it deems necessary the salaries for the following positions:

(1) Governor;

(2) Lieutenant Governor;

(3) Attorney General;

(4) Secretary of State;

(5) Treasurer of State;

(6) Auditor of State;

(7) Commissioner of State Lands;

(8) Member of the General Assembly;

(9) Chief Justice of the Supreme Court;

(10) Justice of the Supreme Court;

(11) Chief Judge of the Court of Appeals;

(12) Judge of the Court of Appeals;

(13) Circuit court judge; and

(14) District court judge.

(e)(1) The salaries of the positions under subsection (d) of this section:

(A) Shall not be subject to appropriation by the General Assembly; and

(B) Shall be paid from the Constitutional Officers Fund or its successor fund or fund accounts in the amount determined by the independent citizens commission.

(2)(A) If the independent citizens commission proposes to adjust a salary for a position under subsection (d) of this section, the independent citizens commission shall:

(i) Provide notice to the public of the proposed salary adjustment;

(ii) Make available to the public any data reviewed by the independent citizens commission in determining the proposed salary adjustment; and

(iii) Afford the public a reasonable opportunity to provide public comment on the proposed salary adjustment.

(B) A proposed salary adjustment of the independent citizens commission shall not be considered a rule under the Arkansas Administrative Procedure Act, Arkansas Code § 25-15-201 et seq.

(3) Upon satisfying (e)(2)(A)(i)-(iii) of this section, the independent citizens commission may file the adjusted salary with the Auditor of State.

(4) An adjustment to a salary shall be effective ten (10) days after it is filed with the Auditor of State.

(5) When considering whether or not to adjust a salary for a position under subsection (d) of this section, the independent citizens commission shall include in its considerations the overall economic condition of the state at that time.

(f)(1)(A) The independent citizens commission, by a majority vote of the total membership of the independent citizens commission cast during its first regularly scheduled meeting of each calendar year, may authorize payment to its members of a stipend not to exceed eighty-five dollars (\$85.00) per day for each meeting attended or for any day while performing any proper business of the independent citizens commission.

(B) Stipends shall be paid by the Auditor of State from funds available for that purpose.

(2) Members of the independent citizens commission shall receive no other compensation, expense reimbursement, or in-lieu-of payments.

(g)(1) The independent citizens commission shall provide that the salaries of circuit judges be uniform throughout the state.

(2)(A) Except as provided in this subdivision (g)(2), the independent citizens commission may increase or diminish the salaries for the positions under subsection (d) of this section.

(B) The independent citizens commission may increase but not diminish the salaries for the positions under subdivisions (d)(9)-(14) of this section.

(3)(A) Except as provided in subdivision (g)(3)(B) of this section, no single adjustment at any one (1) time to a salary by the independent citizens commission shall exceed fifteen percent (15%) of the salary to be increased or diminished.

(B) Salary adjustments resulting from the initial review of the independent citizens commission under subdivision (i)(3) of this section shall not be subject to subdivision (g)(3)(A) of this section.

(4) The independent citizens commission shall provide for salaries to be paid in monthly installments.

(h) Salaries for the positions under subsection (d) of this section shall continue as existing on November 4, 2014, until adjusted by the independent citizens commission.

(i)(1) Initial members of the independent citizens commission shall be appointed within thirty (30) days of the effective date of this section.

(2) The President Pro Tempore of the Senate shall call the first meeting of the independent citizens commission, which shall occur within forty-five (45) days of the effective date of this section.

(3)(A) The independent citizens commission:

(i) Shall complete an initial review of the salaries for the positions under subsection (d) of this section no later than ninety (90) days after the effective date of this section; and

(ii) May file any adjustments in salary resulting from the initial review with the Auditor of State upon satisfying (e)(2)(A)(i)-(iii) of this section.

(B) No later than ninety (90) days after the effective date of this section, the independent citizens commission shall also provide recommendations to the President Pro Tempore of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives concerning the amounts to be paid to members of the General Assembly for:

(i) Per diem;

(ii) Reimbursement for expenses; and

(iii) Reimbursement for mileage.

(4)(A) After completing the initial review under subdivision (i)(3) of this section, the independent citizens commission shall meet as necessary to review the salaries of the positions under subsection (d) of this section but shall not meet less than one (1) time per year.

(B) The independent citizens commission may adjust the salaries of the positions under subsection (d) of this section as provided in this section as it deems necessary.

(j) No later than ninety (90) days before the commencement of a regular session, the independent citizens commission shall provide recommendations to the President Pro Tempore of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives concerning the amounts to be paid to members of the General Assembly for:

be established by law, which shall not be increased or diminished during their respective terms, nor shall any of them, except the Prosecuting Attorneys, after the adoption of this Constitution, receive to his own use any fees, costs, perquisites of office, or other compensation; and all fees that may hereafter be payable by law, for any service performed by any officer mentioned in this section, except Prosecuting Attorneys, shall be paid in advance into the State Treasury; Provided, That the salaries of the respective officers herein mentioned shall never exceed per annum:

For Governor, the sum of \$4,000

For Secretary of State, the sum of \$2,500

For Treasurer of State, the sum of \$3,000

For Auditor of State, the sum of \$3,000

For Attorney General, the sum of \$2,500

For Commissioner of State Lands, the sum of \$2,500

For the Judges of the Supreme Court, each, the sum of \$4,000

For Judges of the Circuit Courts, and Chancellors, each, the sum of \$3,000

For Prosecuting Attorneys, the sum of \$400

And provided further, That the General Assembly shall provide for no increase of salaries of its members which shall take effect before the meeting of the next General Assembly.

SECTION 10. Section 6 of Amendment 6 to the Arkansas Constitution is repealed.

§ 6. Salary of Lieutenant Governor.

The Lieutenant Governor shall receive for his services an annual salary of two thousand dollars, and shall not receive or be entitled to any other compensation, fee or perquisite, for any duty or service he may be required to perform by the Constitution or by law.

SECTION 11. Section 2 of Amendment 9 to the Arkansas Constitution is repealed.

§ 2. Compensation of judges.

The Supreme Court judges shall at stated times receive compensation for their services to be fixed by law. When the salary of the judges under this amendment to the Constitution shall have been established by law, such salary shall not thereafter be increased or diminished during their respective terms. Until otherwise provided by law, the judges of the Supreme Court shall each receive a salary of Seven thousand five hundred dollars per annum.

SECTION 12. Amendment 15 to the Arkansas Constitution is repealed. Salaries of state officials:

The annual salaries of the State and District Officers hereinafter mentioned, which shall be paid in monthly installments, shall be as follows:

For Governor, the sum of \$6,000.00; for Secretary of State, the sum of \$4,000.00; for Treasurer of the State, the sum of \$4,000.00; for Auditor of the State, the sum of \$4,000.00; for Attorney General, the sum of \$5,000.00; for Judge of the Circuit Courts and Chancellors, each, the sum of \$3,600.00.

The members of the General Assembly shall receive as their salary the sum of One Thousand (\$1,000.00) Dollars, except the Speaker of the House of Representatives, who shall receive his salary of Eleven Hundred Dollars (\$1,100.00); for each period of two (2) years; and in addition to such salary the members of the general Assembly shall receive five cents per mile for each mile traveled in going to and returning from the seat of government over the most direct and practicable route; and provided further that when said members are required to attend an extraordinary session of the General Assembly they shall receive in addition to the salary herein provided the sum of 6.00 per day for each day they are required to attend; and mileage at the rate herein provided:

SECTION 13. Amendment 43 to the Arkansas Constitution is repealed. Salaries and expenses of judges.

The General Assembly shall by law determine the amount and method of payment of salaries and expenses of the judges of the Supreme Court, Circuit Courts, Chancery Courts, and Municipal Courts of Arkansas; provided such salaries and expenses may be increased but not diminished during the term for which such judges are elected; provided further that the salaries of Circuit and Chancery Judges shall be uniform throughout the state.

SECTION 14. Section 1 of Amendment 70 of the Arkansas Constitution is amended to read as follows:

§ 1. Executive Department and General Assembly —Salaries— Restrictions on reimbursements.

(a) No official of the Executive Department shall be reimbursed by the State of Arkansas for any expenses except those reasonably connected to their official duties and only if such reimbursement is made for documented expenses actually incurred and from the regular budget appropriated for the official's office. Such restrictions on expense reimbursement are of a general application and also are intended specifically to prohibit the appropriation and use of public relations funds. The annual salaries of the Executive Department, which shall be paid in monthly installments, shall be as follows: the Governor, the sum of \$60,000; the Lieutenant Governor, the sum of \$29,000; the Secretary of State, the sum of \$37,500; the Treasurer of State, the sum of \$37,000; the Attorney General, the sum of \$50,000; the Commissioner of State Lands, the sum of \$37,500; and the Auditor of State, the sum of \$37,500. Except as provided herein in this Constitution, such officials of the Executive Department shall not receive any other income from the State of Arkansas, whether in the form of salaries or expenses.

(b) The members of the General Assembly shall receive as their annual salary the sum of \$12,500, except the President Pro Tempore of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives

danced alongside Marilyn Monroe in her iconic 'Diamonds are a Girl's Best Friend' number.

"She was such a sweetheart and really just a child," recalled Fuller. "She was actually very nervous, but great with all the dancers. I know some directors found her hard to work with, but she was fun with us. We rehearsed that number for three weeks and it took a week to shoot."

With his rugged good looks, Fuller soon found his calling in westerns and the genre's simple message of good trump-

ing evil that resonated with audiences of the day.

In "Wagon Train," Fuller starred in the final two seasons.

"Riding the wagon trains was rough!" recalled Fuller. "The wagons used on the show were exactly the same as the originals. They didn't have padded seats, so you bounced real hard as they creaked and cracked. I can't imagine how the pioneers rode thousands of miles across the country in them!"

The popularity of TV westerns peaked in the late '50s with more than two dozen primetime offerings. But the era was doomed as audience demographics shifted in

the '60s when interest in crime dramas, sci-fi series, and comedies exploded.

Fuller says politicians, Parent Teacher Associations, and political correctness killed the TV western for good.

"The PTA came out very hard against cowboys wearing guns, shooting, and violence," he recalled. "They complained to [Senator] Teddy Kennedy who went to the FCC and they started cutting the shooting and fights out of our scripts. Pretty soon, cowboys were carrying purses instead of guns! TV westerns are now part of entertainment history and they'll never come back."

While the shows may

be gone - or at least survive in cable reruns and on DVDs - stars like Fuller keep the "code of the West" alive at events such as the Spirit of the Cowboy Festival by sharing memories with devoted followers.

"I have a great fan following and know many of them personally," said Fuller, who turned 81 in July. "They come to almost every festival where I appear, including one woman who flies over from Japan! 'Laramie' was the number one show on Japanese television for years because they considered my character, Jess Harper, to be like a Samurai."

That character, like many western heroes, was a champion of justice who stood up for the underdog.

"I still get mail from people telling me they patterned their way of life after that character," notes Fuller. "Actors and TV shows can affect people and thankfully in a positive way."
