

Baldrige charged in copper wire theft

James Baldrige, 42, which carries a sentence of Pleasant Grove was arrested on a felony warrant for theft of copper wire, according to a news release from the Stone County Sheriff's Office. The theft of the copper wire, valued at over \$6,000, was investigated by the sheriff's department the first week of March. Baldrige was charged with a class B felony, which carries a sentence of five to twenty years and a fine not to exceed \$25,000.

Sheriff Lance Bonds reminds residents to keep an eye on their vacant property and farms. He said people are stealing scrap metal and copper wire and he asks the public to call his office (269-3825) if they see any suspicious activity.

Graduation moved indoors to OFC

Mountain View School's graduation ceremony will take place at the Ozark Folk Center next month, the school board decided last Monday.

All three campuses have a shared baccalaureate, which is also in the large auditorium of the Folk Center at 6 p.m. on May 14.

Graduation will be May 18, with Mountain View at 9:30 at the Folk Center, Timbo at 5 p.m. in the gym, and Rural Special at 7 p.m. in the gym.

Mountain View has scheduled graduation on the football field in recent years, with the

auditorium serving as a back-up in case of inclement weather. The auditorium has been used the past four years.

There has been concern about space in the Folk Center auditorium. The auditorium seats close to 1,000, but space was tight, and the school had to limit the number of attendees for each graduate.

Supt. Rowdy Ross told the board last week that High School Principal Steve Lucas wanted to go ahead and set the ceremony at the Folk Center.

Lucas indicated that he would prefer that, as a lot can go wrong with

Festival is this weekend

The Arkansas Folk Festival kicks off Thursday night with a Young Musicians Concert at 6:30 p.m. at the Ozark Folk Center. Some of the outstanding talent among local youth will perform a free show, and donations will be accepted to benefit the local Music Roots program, which provides instruction and loaner instruments to school-aged children.

Friday features the opening of Artisans Market on the Square at noon. This show/sale of handmade crafts and wares will be north side of the courtsquare across Washington St.

Music on the courthouse stage begins at 11 a.m. Friday and runs until the Merchant Fashion show takes over the stage at 4 p.m.

Saturday's main attraction is the parade on Main Street, running west from Maple Avenue to Martin St. (near Sonic). Parade grand marshals are sisters Elsie Morris Compton, age 102, and Ruby Morris Berry, age 94. They are two of eleven children of Jeff and Gertrude Morris. Their

Storm produces tornado damage

A strong storm system moved through Stone County last Wednesday evening, spinning up funnel clouds and at least one tornado as it moved into Stone County from the southwest.

After hitting the Rushing area where it damaged roofs on residences and a broiler house, a tornado hit the Tony Ross farm on Ross Road near Mozart around 5:45 p.m. Five barns - some originally built as broiler houses - were destroyed, along with a section of roof on another.

Many of the buildings were constructed in 1979 after an April

11 tornado destroyed broiler houses and barns at the same location.

"I'm getting tired of this scene," Rowdy Ross said. His brother, Steve, said their parents Tony and Sarah had been watching television and received the warning about the impending storm and had gone to the storm shelter, which was built about a week after the previous tornado. The couple heard the roar and the racket as the buildings were dismantled, but once again found their home basically unharmed.

The Red Doors community - which was hit by an April 14 tornado in 1996 - also was in

JPs approve contract to purchase solid waste site

Stone County Quorum Court approved a contract last Thursday to purchase the site of the recycling center and solid waste transfer station.

The property is located on Recycle Center Road, off Highway 5 North.

County Judge Stacey Avey reported to the quorum court that he has a signed contract between the county and

the Tinkle family who own the property.

"We have everything signed, and all we need is a vote from the quorum court," Avey said.

There is a closing date of April 30 on the purchase.

The total purchase price on the 15 acres is \$75,000, but the county has a grant through White River Planning & Development that will pay \$60,000.

The county has leased

the property for several years and has built a building for the recycling center and installed the compactor and other equipment for collecting and transporting trash. Avey commented that the price of \$5,000 an acre includes all of this infrastructure, which the county would have to leave behind if they were unable to buy the land and had to find a new site.

Justice of the Peace

Jim Qualls noted that the county's portion of the cost, \$15,000, represents only about two and half years of rent. The county is currently paying \$6,600 a year for the lease.

Officials have hoped to buy the land for some time, as this will allow the county to obtain grants to make some necessary improvements to the facility. The plan is to do away with the old compactor and

build a facility for placing trash directly into open-top hauling containers.

Qualls asked Avey if the county might now declare the road leading to the scales a county road and pave it. Avey said they probably can.

Officials also discussed the recent economic development meeting that took place March 26 at Ozarka College. Avey said he had learned a lot

at the meeting and feels it will definitely be beneficial.

"It's already helped us in some ways," he said, explaining that he has had a couple of inquiries about the Conestoga building since the meeting.

Avey said he wants to schedule a follow-up meeting of county, city,

the storm's path. Trees were downed and homes received minor damage, especially on each side of the church. Gary Fritz, who lives just west of the church, said he and his wife watched for the storm out the front door, then when they saw it and heard what sounded like an 18-wheeler barreling toward them, they ran for cover in the basement. A huge tree was uprooted in the yard at the J.E. Trammell residence on the east side.

Damage was also seen along Happy Hollow Road near Shannon Road and Kermit Road. Trees were downed along a one-mile stretch of road, according to Glen Crymes, county director of the office

of emergency services. Barns, an old home, and roof shingles were reported damaged or destroyed.

Closer to town, structural damage to some of the buildings at the former Conestoga plant was reported, and trees were uprooted along Kera Drive off Gaylor Road.

Crymes said if anyone has not reported damage to his office they should do so by calling 269-6611. As of Friday he had not received reports of major residential damage, and said the county would likely not qualify for inclusion in the disaster declaration.

County roads also suffered from the heavy rains that accompanied the storm. About six inches of rain was recorded at Alco, and three inches at Newnata. All roads were cleared of trees and made passable by Thursday.

Cemetery situation clarified

Mayor Ron Sterling cleared up some rumors of a cemetery being destroyed in the White-water Estates subdivision.

"It's not going on," Ron Sterling told the council, after Council Member Cindy Moore asked about the situation at last Tuesday's regular meeting. He explained there are two graves in the subdivision, which are marked off with posts in compliance with Arkansas' 50 ft. burial site boundary law.

Planning and Zoning Officer Charles Ramsey is involved with the housing development, and all the regulations are being followed, Sterling said.

Also at the meeting the council agreed to take bids for a compact excavator. The excavator will be purchased with bond issue money, and used to improve the city's water and sewer lines.

Councilmen Roger Gardner and Bruce Stevens were appointed to

view specifications on various excavators.

In other business the council:

- heard from Sterling that a new police officer has been hired. Police Officer Reuben Balentine is retiring May 1, and Richard Chrome will be taking his place.
- tabled the Peace Pole project to give the council members time to review the plans.
- adopted Ordinance 2013-02, changing city council meeting times to 6 p.m.

From our files

April 1983 30 Years Ago

Music, crafts and various other events were enjoyed by a crowd estimated at over 75,000 persons last weekend as the first half of the 21st annual Arkansas Folk Festival took place here. Community leaders have said that they feel this year's first weekend was one of the more successful in several years. Based upon sales, the number of persons in attendance and the general atmosphere that pervaded in Mountain View last weekend, they were right.

Legislation introduced in congress this month by Second District Representative Ed Bethune would, if passed, make possible the designation of about 15,000 acres of wilderness northwest of Stone County. The land at stake is the Leatherwood watershed, a rugged, scenic tract bordering the Buffalo River in Marion, Baxter and Searcy counties. It is located in the Sylamore District of the Ozark-St. Francis National Forest.

Pam Risner of Mountain View has been named a missionary journeyman by the Southern Baptist Foreign Mission Board and is scheduled to go to Peru, where she will teach under the guidance of an experienced missionary.

April 1993 20 Years Ago

The 31st Annual Arkansas Folk Festival could hardly have had a wider variety of weather conditions.

A clear, windy and cold day Friday presented a challenge to those who looked for a sheltered spot to gather and play music outdoors. Saturday dawned warmer but cloudy and, for the first time in recent memory, rain started falling during the annual festival parade.

Since its population has been at least 1,500, the City of Mountain View has had the option of adopting an ordinance to change its status from second class city to first class city. Now that the population exceeds 2,500 some have requested that the council take action.

Morel hunt leads to other finds

The Heritage Herb Garden at the Ozark Folk Center graces the park with visual colors and textures, sweet and pungent aromas, and helps us to interpret the history of the human use of plants.
On Sunday I took a hike out into my woods to look for morel mushrooms. I found one. I might have harvested many more had I not been startled by a "spreading adder" snake, *Heterodon platirhinos*, that I almost tread upon. I knew it was a spreading adder because of the way it reared up, acting all fierce, looking like a cobra until I did the Arkansas two-step, backwards. I then

perched on a boulder to see what my dogs and cat would do when they caught sight of it. I think my cat smelled it first because, though she was many yards away, she suddenly growled and raised her fur, doubling her size. My dogs were oblivious for several minutes until Snoop finally heard it rustle the leaves. He came to attention, snarled and barked but did not approach the snake. The cat snuck up on the reptile and stood guard over it until everyone finally lost interest and went separate ways. Spreading adders do not have a toxic bite. They will head butt anything that is not scared off by their attitudes. They feed on amphibians, especially toads. The one that resides in my woods is grey on top, lacking patterns and has a yellow belly. Also known as a hog-nose snake, one can tell a spreading adder by its upturned snout. As a gardener, I wish this snake would not need to eat toads, as these creatures eat a whole lot of pests that bother the plants. Continuing the hunt for the elusive morel, I noted spring beauties and toothwort in bloom and trout lily leaves carpeting the wet forest floor. The new tree leaves will soon mask the damaged crowns broken by the big ice storm several years ago. I experienced a quiet acceptance of both the joy that new spring growth brings and the sadness of the destruction left by that terrible storm. I also got my first tick bites of the season and removed dozens of them from my clothing with tape. If only I had found as many morels. Elder shrubs are leafed out, both in the woods and in the herb garden! In the Heritage Herb Garden we are excited to have a whole lot of elder cuttings making roots as well. These will be on sale to

plant in your garden, as soon as we have them potted up. Elder is Herb of the Year 2013. The flowers and berries provide good and prolific wild food and beverage ingredients. Medicinally, both the flowers and fruit help to ward off the flu virus and will shorten its duration. Little wonder that the International Herb Association would honor this useful plant. A book of the same title is available at the Herb Shoppe, inside the Craft Village along with other *Herb of the Year* publications. Each *Herb of the Year* contains in-depth information on the featured herb, from cooking to medicinal remedies and chemistry to growing requirements, written by experts and passionate herbal hobbyists. This week there is so much to do between thunderstorms. In your garden and mine, the henbit, dead nettle and chickweed have gone to flower and need to be removed from the garden beds and fed to the compost pile. Mulch the freshly weeded soil with finished compost. It is time to make space for new plants! I hope you will pay a visit to the Ozark Folk Center to see our selection of herb and native plant starts. Get out into the woods to enjoy this wet and cool spring. If you are out in the wild, be sure to wear insect repellent. Speaking from Sunday's experience, I can testify that the ticks are numerous and hungry! Bring your field guides to be sure to know the identity of the mushrooms before eating them and to give the spreading adders a break. If I don't see you in the future - I'll see you in the pasture!

House vote supports steel mill

LEGISLATIVE UPDATE

From our state legislators

Economic development, constitutional amendments, and healthcare were just three of the big issues before us in the 13th week of the session. We began this week with a historic vote. For the first time in the state's history, the House approved a measure to support a major economic development with loans backed by General Revenue. SB820 has been signed by the governor and is now Act 1084. The act outlines the incentives to bring a \$1.1 billion dollar investment to Mississippi County. Construction is expected to begin late this year. The legislation states that Big River Steel must employ at least 300 individuals at an average wage of \$70,000 per year in order to receive state supported bonds. The company has said publicly it plans to hire over 500 workers. The construction of the plant could support 2,000 jobs. Big River Steel will produce steel used in the oil and gas industry for pipes and tubing, steel for the automotive industry, and steel used

in transformers and electric motors. We will be asked to consider the funding for this in a separate bill in the final week. In the final days of every session, legislators consider proposed Constitutional Amendments. We can refer up to three amendments to voters during a regular session. The amendments appear on the next general election ballot. This week, the House approved its first amendment of the session. HJR1009 is titled the Arkansas Elected Officials Ethics, Transparency and Financial Reform Amendment of 2014. This amendment would place a ban on corporate contributions to political campaigns and it increases the cooling off period from 1 year to 2 years before former elected officials could work as a lobbyist. It also creates a citizens commission to set the salary levels for the General Assembly. In addition, HJR1009 would alter current term

limit laws by allowing members to serve a total of 16 years in the legislature. Members could choose to serve 16 years in the House or Senate or divide the years of the terms between the two chambers. Currently, we can serve up to 6 years in the House, and in certain circumstances members of the Senate can serve up to 10 years. As we head home for the weekend, we are being asked to consider the funding measure for what is being referred to as the private option. In a vote of 63 to 35, with one member voting present, the House passed the Health Care Independence Act. SB1020 is the enabling legislation. However, it takes 75 votes to approve the appropriation necessary for its implementation. That funding is in written into HB1219, which we will be voting on early next week. Stone County is represented in the State House of Representatives by Tommy Wren in District 62 and John Payton in District 64.

chamber of commerce, and Stone County Area Industrial Development Corporation. He plans to arrange a meeting around April 23.

Also during the meeting, the court heard a presentation from Karen Ryan, chief executive officer of Vital Link Emergency Medical Service (EMS). The city of Mountain View has a franchise agreement giving Vital Link sole authority to provide ambulance service in the city. The county also has an interlocal agreement with the city to receive this service, making the franchise effective for the whole county.

Ryan explained that this five-year agreement is about to end, and Vital Link is applying for a renewed agreement. The city will have to grant the franchise agreement first, and, if that's approved, she will be back at quorum court next month to seek county approval, as well.

Ryan presented a lot of information about Vital Link. The not-for-profit company has a 12-member, volunteer board of directors, which includes two members from Mountain View. Vital Link serves Stone, Independence and Izard counties and offers many optional procedures, electronic medical records, and up-to-date equipment on its ambulances.

The service answered 2,000 calls in Stone County last year and actually transported 1,748 patients.

Families have the option to buy a \$50/year Vital Link membership, and if anyone in the family is transported, Vital Link will bill their insurance provider and then write off any additional cost.

JP Stan Townsend inquired if Vital Link answers all calls, regardless of ability to pay. Ryan said that they do.

He also asked if Stone

County could create its own EMS advisory board, and she said that is an option.

In other business the court:

- approved an expenditure of around \$18,000 to replace parts in three of the community's tornado sirens. Office of Emergency Services Director Glen Crymes explained that the sirens at the fairgrounds, Pleasant Grove and Fifty Six are not working. (Others are located at Mountain View School, the sheriff's office, Fox, and Timbo.) At least two of them have been damaged by lightning. Crymes said he has spoken to the mayor and hopes the city will cover the repairs to the one located in the city limits. The community has had the sirens for 13 years, and the county has taken care of all their maintenance. This is the first time a major repair has been needed.

- heard reports on recent committee meetings, including court security/emergency preparedness, sanitation and building. The sanitation/building meeting pertained to the land purchase. The court security meeting addressed Judge John Dan Kemp's con-

cerns about the courthouse. The JPs agreed to schedule a meeting of the building and law enforcement committees after Folk Festival to discuss the courthouse.

- tabled a request from public defender Tammy Harris to renew an interlocal agreement that establishes what percentage of her expenses are paid by each of the five counties she serves. Harris explained that the percentages are based on the population of each county. Stone County is responsible for 12.28 percent of operating expenses and 16.52 percent of office expenses. The county will actually reimburse Cleburne County for its part. This agreement was put in place by the county judges to help get expenses under control under the previous public defender. The JPs agreed to consider the agreement next month after they have a chance to look at it more closely.

- heard a report from Stone County Extension Agent Preston Hipp. He discussed recent agriculture tours and conferences, as well as the success of 4-H teams and the Family and Consumer Science programs.

Activities for the weekend include classes in craft, foodways, and sustainable agriculture, artisan lunches prepared by local cooks, a farm-to-table candle-light dinner, and concert by the band Finnegans Wake. All activities will take place at Tomahawk Creek Farm in beautiful rural Stone County, 10 miles southeast of Mountain View. Participants must pre-register and may choose from

Softball team having good season

The Lady Yellow-jacket softball team has started out the season with a full schedule of games, resulting in a 2-1 conference record and 8-7 overall record.

In the final game of the tournament versus ICC, the Lady Jackets started out down 4-0 until the fourth inning, when they rallied to score in the next three consecutive innings. This run was started by Rush hitting a double, and continuing with senior Lauren Rush and sophomore Mika Vanatter's two RBIs in the fifth inning. Senior Timber Gilbert and Vanatter put together three more RBIs in the sixth inning,

but fell short of the Cougars 7-6.

In their first conference game, the Lady Jackets defeated Marshall 28-18. They followed this with two losses in a row, one to Greers Ferry and the other to a conference rival, the Melbourne Bearcats.

April 6, the Lady Jackets entered the Heber Tournament, which hosted some of the best competition around, including teams that were in the top three of their state tournaments last year. They lost to Cedar Ridge 3-1, and Buffalo Island 4-0, but gained valuable experience at this high level tournament. Tori Wade batted 3 for 4, plus a sacrifice bunt to help the Lady Jackets. They have now warmed up and won two games back to back, trouncing Norfolk 11-1 and another conference team, Yellville Summit, 12-2.

The team, coached by Michael Gray and assistant coach Sheryl Greenway, is made up of three seniors, two juniors, twelve sophomores, and three freshmen. Standouts include senior Timber Gilbert, starting catcher, who is the team's strongest and most consistent batter at .350. Starting pitcher Megan Rush, a left-handed junior, has been a big boost for the team with her multi-

tude of pitches and ball movement. Rush has had a total of 125 strikeouts this season. For the sophomores, Hannah Davis makes an impact as the starting shortstop, and first baseman Haleigh Stevens is the team's lead-off hitter and is responsible for numerous unassisted outs. According to coaches, all three freshmen are showing great potential and will be a great help in future years.

The team has three conference games left to play, and Greenway looks forward to the rest of the season.

"I'm very hopeful of how we will finish the

year out, and there is no reason that we shouldn't be at state again this year," she said.

The team is scheduled to play Thursday and Friday at home.

Turkey Creek School featured during event

Turkey Creek Schoolhouse and Fox Community Center were two of the sites featured as part of the Ozark Byways "Spring Blossom Tour" Saturday. Ten communities in the Ozark Byways networks hosted local heritage activities during the special event. At Fox, Dave Smith presented storytelling and music in the morning, following by music by Fox Mountain Bluegrass Band in the afternoon. Crafts and food vendors were also on hand throughout the day. The Turkey Creek Schoolhouse hosted a variety of activities related to the history of this interesting site, including old-time games, a shape-note singing school, a blab school, and a spelling bee. Music Roots students also performed. According to a written history of the school available at the event, there is some thought that possibly two other schools existed in the Turkey Creek area before this one. Coleman Morris recalled another school, less than a quarter mile away, that was

just an open-sided building with a roof. School was held there only in the summer. It is also thought that there was a school on the Thompson Morris place. The present school site was donated by R.R. Daniels and his wife, Rachel, in 1923. At least one term was taught in a log house belonging to George Green, which was up the creek from the present site, while the new school was being built. Altha Hinesley (Green) was an early teacher at the school. The first classes were begun in the winter, with just a little sheet iron stove. Water was carried from a spring until a well was dug later. The original blackboard is still in the building. Ruby Morris Berry told of Mr. Robert Hawkins building desks and seats for the school out under the shade trees while school was in progress. Coleman Morris said George Green and Robert Hawkins were hired to build the school house. School was conducted there from January, 1925, until August, 1947.

CHARITABLE DONATIONS FROM IRAs CAN STILL BE MADE

From your IRA to the charity of your choice - the option to make a qualified charitable distribution from your Roth or traditional IRA is once again available. *The American Taxpayer Relief Act of 2012* included a provision that again allows taxpayers age 70½ or older to make donations of up to \$100,000 directly from their regular or Roth IRAs. Charitable IRA distributions are penalty-free withdrawals that are neither included in, nor deducted from, your taxable income. 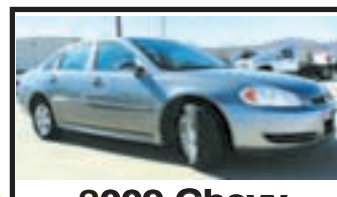

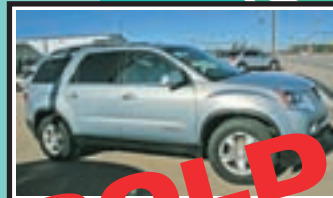

Joint committee chooses three proposed amendments

Senate

The Joint State Agencies and Governmental Affairs Committee chose three proposed constitutional amendments to refer to voters.

If the Senate and House both agree with the committee's decision, the three will be on the 2014 general election ballot. However, other measures could emerge from the 2013 session. In each regular session, the legislature may refer up to three proposed amendments for Arkansas voters to decide in a statewide election.

One proposed amendment, HJR 1009, would impose stricter ethical standards for public officials, to lessen the influence of special interest lobbyists.

It would prohibit contributions to political campaigns from corpo-

rations, and it would prohibit legislators from registering as lobbyists for at least two years after they leave office. If voters approve the amendment, public officials could not accept gifts from lobbyists.

The amendment would make slight changes in term limits for legislators. Under the current term limits amendment, an individual is limited to three terms of two years each in the House of Representatives, and two terms of four years in the Senate.

The amendment would allow an individual to serve a total of 16 years in the General Assembly. Those 16 years could all be served in one chamber, or they

could be served in a combination of both the Senate and the House. Also, it would create an independent commission to determine salaries of the legislature, judges and executive branch officials.

After the State Agencies Committee advanced HJR 1009, the entire Senate referred it back to committee for changes.

The Senate voted against another proposed amendment advanced out of the State Agencies Committee. It is SJR 16 to tighten standards for organizations that try to place initiated acts and constitutional referendums on the ballot.

Organizations sup-

porting a ballot initiative must submit a minimum number of signatures of registered voters four months prior to the November general election, i.e., a date in early July. If signatures are invalidated, the groups can get an extension to collect more.

The third constitutional amendment, SJR 7, would grant the legislature power to approve new rules and regulations proposed by state agencies. Currently, legislators can review but they cannot overturn new rules with which they disagree. The Senate voted in favor of SJR 7 and sent it to the House.

If voters approve SJR 7, no new rules put forth

by executive branch agencies would take effect unless they had been approved by legislators, who answer to the voting public.

Numerous changes to election laws have been filed this session. Act 595, to require voters to have a photo ID, has garnered most of the attention. Others include SB 719 to create a voter integrity unit within the Secretary of State's office and SB 721 to end the terms of the state Board of Election Commissioners, effective July 1, and expand it from seven to nine members. The Senate approved both bills.

Both the Senate and House have approved HB 1737 to limit the size

of a voting precinct to 3,000 registered voters. The bill also requires that no later than 30 minutes after the polls close on election day, the county board of election commissioners shall report the initial count of early votes and absentee ballot votes to the Secretary of State.

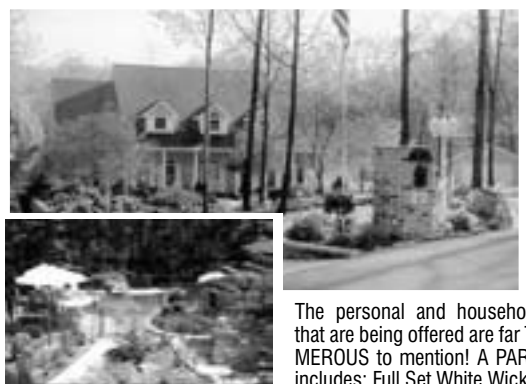

The Indiana Bat Habitat Restoration Project

Pursuant to 36 CFR 215.5, District Ranger James R. McCoy requests comments on the Indiana Bat Habitat Restoration Project. A Draft Environmental Assessment (EA) for this project has been completed. It is intended to restore roosting and foraging habitat for the endangered Indiana bat as well as to protect this species from human disturbance during the hibernating period. The project area involves approximately 67,151 acres of National Forest Service land and would be

implemented over the next 12 years. No actions are proposed on private land. The EA will be posted at <http://www.fs.usda.gov/projects/osfnf/landmanagement/projects> under the Sylamore Ranger District and it is also available upon request.

Alternative 2, the proposed action, has been identified as the preferred alternative. It involves gating and/or fencing caves used by hibernating Indiana bats; commercial timber harvests (no more than 3,500 acres/year); reforestation (no more than 700 acres/year); dormant or growing season prescribed burning (on average of 15,000 acres/year) with up to 2.0 miles/year total of mechanically constructed prescribed fire control line; mechanical treatments (no more than 600 acre/year); timber stand improvement and site preparation actions (no more than 2,000 acres/year); wildlife stand improvement actions (no more than 2,000 acres/year); treatment of non-native invasive plant infestations with herbicide (no more than 1,100 acres/year); purchaser road maintenance (no more than 15 miles/year total); road reconstruction (no more than 10 miles/year total); monitoring, and actions to facilitate removal of harvested timber that include construction of skid trails, log landings and temporary roads as needed. TSI, WSI and site preparation may be accomplished with herbicide applications, manual, mechanical or prescribed burning treatments. Treatment of non-native invasive plants involves the use of herbicide. Most herbicide applications will be made directly to the targeted stem; only citrus based surfactant or vegetable oil carrier would be used to improve treatment efficacy. No applications will be made by airplane and no herbicide will be applied directly to water or soil. Annually the District will post monitoring results and the planned program of work for the next year on the Ozark-St. Francis National Forests website.

This is an adaptive management project; triggers to adjust management have been built-in if monitoring indicates project objectives are not being met, if unintended effects from herbicide use occur or if non-native invasive plant control treatments are ineffective.

The opportunity to comment on this project ends 30 days following the date of publication of this legal notice. Only those persons, non-Federal organizations or entities that comment or otherwise express interest during the 30-day comment period will be eligible to appeal the subsequent decision on this project. In order to have appeal eligibility, each individual or representative must either sign the comments or verify identity upon request. Comments received, including the names and addresses of those who comment, will be considered part of the public record for this project and will be available for public inspection.

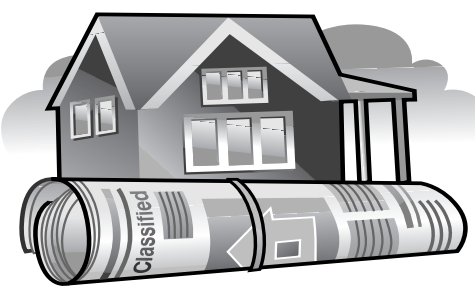
