WRHS cuts 90 positions to counter revenue loss

White River Health System (WRHS) has announced it is reducing expenses to counter the negative economic impact of the COVID-19 crisis, including terminating approximately 90 employees throughout the organization.

Details about staff reductions at Stone County Medical Center were not available, but a news release from WRHS stated the organization was reducing its leadership team (vice presidents and directors) by 25 percent, extending furloughs, reducing hours, and eliminating some positions.

"To protect the privacy of those affected by the layoffs, we will not release facility specific information," Public Relations Coordinator Sheila Mace said. "Across the organization, we are extending furloughs, reducing hours, and reducing compensation. We are confident we have the bedside caregivers and providers needed to provide excellent medical care at Stone County Medical Center and all the facilities throughout our organization."

Mace added that the reductions were prompted by revenue

losses from the downturn in elective procedures during the COVID crisis.

"Reduction of elective procedures and the decline in emergency department visits, provider office visits, and diagnostic tests and procedures have affected hospitals and healthcare organizations across Arkansas, including White River Health System. As the economy

in our local communities heals and volume improves, we will make every effort to create employment opportunities for those affected by staff reductions."

"While we are making changes to our operations, our commitment and ability to provide excellent patient care is unwavering," said Gary Paxson, WRHS President.

Two nursing home staff test positive

All residents at The Waters of Mountain View nursing facility have tested negative for COVID-19, but two staff members are positive, possibly delaying plans to reopen for limited visitation.

Longterm care facilities were issued guidelines for resuming visitation as of July 1, with testing of all residents and staff being required. Tammy Romero, administrator at the facility, confirmed that two staff members received positive results last Friday and are now

quarantined at home.

"We did have two staff members come back positive, no residents. We have all the results back. Those staff members are at home. They can't come back to work. They have to wait the designated time the ADH sets."

"All residents were tested and were negative," she said.

Romero will be consulting with the Arkansas Department of Health to get their guidance on moving forward with visitation.

Romero said both

Each graduate's parents will be allowed to sit on the field, and each graduate will receive an additional six tickets for guests.

(In the case of students with two sets of parents, all parents may sit on the field and not be counted in the six tickets.)

Tickets will be given to the graduates, and all attendees must have a ticket to be admitted.

Masks will be required for everyone attending graduation.

All guests will be socially distanced, with both sides of the bleachers being used. Attendees may also bring lawn chairs and sit on the field behind the parents, with appropriate spacing. There will also be special handicapped seating on the track.

Howard said there will be two entrances to the stadium, one by the fieldhouse and one farther up toward the middle school, and principals and law enforcement officers will be on hand to direct vehicles.

Groups will not be allowed to congregate before or after the ceremony.

Howard said he is hoping for fair weather, as there will not be an indoor alternative this year. He also noted that the ticket limits and other restrictions will apply the same to each school's ceremony.

All ceremonies will begin at 7 p.m., with Rural Special on Tuesday, Timbo Thursday, and Mountain View Friday.

Charges shifted to federal court

Charges in Stone County Circuit Court against Belinda Lewis, 36, and Jason Brewer, 47, were nolle prossed (declined prosecution at this time) because the case has been transferred to the United States District Court.

The two were indicted by a federal grand jury in arrest warrants signed June 5 in the Eastern District of Arkansas. They were charged by the grand jury that, "On or about September, 2019, in the Eastern District of Arkansas and elsewhere, the defendants Belinda Lewis and Jason Brewer, employed, used, persuaded, induced, enticed, and coerced a minor to engage in sexually explicit conduct for the purpose of producing a visual depiction of such conduct, knowing or having reason to know that such visual depiction would be transported or transmitted using any means or facility of interstate and foreign commerce, and such visual depiction has actually been transported and transmitted in or affecting interstate and foreign commerce."

Lewis and Brewer were charged in Stone County Circuit Court with child pornography charges December 16, 2019, and were being held in the Stone County Jail for trial, but now will be tried in federal district court.

Hiker lost overnight in forest

A weekend family hiking trip turned in to an overnight search in the national forest for a Melbourne woman, but with a happy ending.

Crystal Johnson, 30, was hiking with her family from Rosa Hole to Blanchard Springs Recreation Area. She told her family to go on

and she would catch up to them, according to the Stone County Sheriff's Office. When she didn't show up the call was made to the sheriff's office at 8:18 Saturday evening. Searchers from the sheriff's department, the U.S. Forest Service, The Arkansas Game and Fish Department, Mountain View Fire Department, Fifty Six Fire Department, Allison Sylamore Fire Department, Baxter County Sheriff's Department using a helicopter and the Melbourne Fire Department joined the search.

She was found Sunday in the Blanchard Springs area at 12:30 in good shape after spending the night in the forest.

of the employees who tested positive were asymptomatic.

They have already been retested, she noted, and are awaiting results on the follow-up tests.

When the nursing home is able to move forward with visitation, it will still be very limited, according to Romero and Director of Nursing Rachel Day.

Some families have been visiting residents through the window but have not been allowed to enter the building. Even food vendors are leaving deliveries outside and are not coming in.

When the new guidelines take effect, visitors will be able to come inside, but visits will be by appointment and will be limited to certain hours. Visitors will have to wear protective equipment including masks and will be screened at the door.

"We're just trying to let people in but trying to keep the residents as safe as we can," Day said.

"Our folks really need to see their families, and we really need to see their families. We miss them," Romero added.

Kathy Hart, administrator at Mountain View Residential Home - A Waters Community, confirmed that all the residents and staff in that facility have tested negative, so they will be re-opening visitation in a limited manner.

"We have 100 percent of our tests back. Both residents and staff are negative," she said.

Hart said there are extensive guidelines required, including a screening process for visitors, record-keeping, and use of protective equipment.

The residential home, where residents are generally more mobile, has been allowing some outdoor visits on the porch already and will still encourage those when the weather is not too hot. However, visits may also take place in the indoor sitting room where the staff can keep things sanitized.

Visits will also be limited to two guests at a time.

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IMPORTANT! You May Owe a Tax Payment This Month
Find out if you owe the IRS an estimated tax payment

You may owe the IRS a tax payment for your 2020 tax return and not know it.

Most Americans have income taxes withheld from their paychecks, with their employer sending a tax payment to the IRS on your behalf. This year, however, many more Americans will have to write Uncle Sam a check to pay a portion of their 2020 taxes on or before July 15. You may be one of these people!

Who needs to pay now!
You may need to make a payment if one of the following situations applies to you:

- **Paychecks are under-withheld.** Your employer withholds a portion of your paychecks for income tax purposes, then submits a payment to the IRS on your behalf. The amount that is withheld from your paychecks, however, may not cover your entire tax liability, resulting in you needing to write the IRS a check. If you're not withholding enough, ask your employer to increase the withholding amount from your future paychecks so you don't come up short again in the future.
- **Unemployment compensation paychecks are under-withheld.** Unemployment compensation is subject to federal income tax and subject to income taxes in several states. While some unemployment benefit checks withhold a percentage of your payment for income tax purposes, you may need to pay more in taxes than is being withheld.
- **Self-employed workers.** Unlike employees, self-employed workers don't have income tax withheld from pay and must make four estimated tax payments over a period of 12 months. Self-employed workers include gig economy workers, freelancers, S corporation shareholders and partners in a partnership.
- **Retirees.** You may owe tax on Social Security benefits, as well as income from investments distributed to you or other unearned income. A portion of pension plan distributions may be withheld, but many times the amount withheld does not cover your entire tax liability, resulting in an underpayment.
- **Sold a major asset.** You may owe tax after selling an asset that results in a large capital gain, such as a house, or from the sale of securities.
- **Receive alimony.** If you're being paid alimony under a divorce decree entered into before 2019, the payments constitute taxable income to you. Alimony from post-2018 agreements, however, are not taxable.

What you need to do
Estimate your total income for 2020, then calculate your total 2020 tax bill and divide it by 2. Compare this amount to how much has been withheld from your paychecks, unemployment benefits and any other payments you've made to the IRS. If you're short, consider making an estimated payment by July 15 to make up the difference. This payment is made with Form 1040-ES.

If you do not make this payment on time, the IRS may impose a penalty plus interest on top of the underpaid taxes. Fortunately, you can avoid a penalty by paying at least 90% of the current year's tax liability or 100% of the prior year's tax liability (110% if your adjusted gross income for the prior year exceeds \$150,000).

Face Covering Guidance

- Should be worn in all indoor settings where you are exposed to non-household members and physical distancing of six feet or more cannot be assured.
- Should be worn at all outdoor settings where you are exposed to non-household members, unless there is space (six feet or more) to practice physical distancing.
- Cloth face coverings have been shown to be sufficient for the general public and effective in preventing transmission.
- Face coverings should cover both the mouth and nose to be effective.

In addition, CDC also recommends that everyone wear cloth face coverings when leaving their homes, regardless of whether they have fever or symptoms of COVID-19. This is because of evidence that people with COVID-19 can spread the disease, even when they don't have any symptoms. Cloth face coverings should not be placed on young children under age 2, anyone who has trouble breathing, or is unconscious, incapacitated or otherwise unable to remove the mask without assistance.

Coalition receives Delta Dental grant

The Stone County Hometown Health Planning Coalition has received \$7,000 in grant funds from Delta Dental for the purpose of assisting residents age 60 and over with their daily needs, according to board member Leneil Taylor.

The deadline for applications for assistance has been extended to July 10. To receive an application, call 870-269-4381. There are income guidelines, and lowest-income applicants will be given priority. To be eligible, monthly income for a

two-person household cannot exceed \$1,832, for instance.

Some items that will be available to approved applicants are household cleaning supplies, laundry supplies, paper goods and personal hygiene products. Residents will be able to

choose what they need.

Those needing help paying for prescriptions can apply for that and requests will be reviewed on a one-on-one basis, Taylor noted.

The Delta Dental of Arkansas Foundation committed \$500,000 for a COVID-19 Emergency Fund. Through this fund, the Foundation offered grants of up to \$10,000 to Arkansas nonprofit organizations addressing immediate COVID-19 needs.

COVID-19 reason for absentee ballots

As Secretary of State and Chief Election Officer for the State of Arkansas, I have been receiving many questions and have listened to the many concerns of the citizens of Arkansas as to the upcoming November election. We are fortunate in Arkansas that we have in place the means by which registered voters may request an absentee ballot. According to Ark. Code Ann. §§ 7-5-402 and 7-5-404, a voter may request an absentee ballot due to one of the following reasons:

- You will be unavoidably absent from your polling site on Election Day, OR
- You will be unable to attend your polling site on election day due to illness or physical disability, OR
- You are a member of the Uniformed Services, merchant marines or the spouse or a dependent family member and are away from your polling location due to the member's active duty status, OR
- A U.S. citizen whose residence is in Arkansas but is temporarily living outside the territorial limits of the

United States.

Those provisions, as provided by state law, allow the voters of the state to contact their local County Clerk, and request an absentee ballot for one of the stated reasons. I understand many of our citizens may be assisting loved ones or are fearful of exposing a vulnerable family member to the virus. I understand that many are fearful of contacting or passing along the virus to others in the community. While my office continues to work with county officials to prepare polling locations, we are also anticipating and preparing for an increase in Absentee Ballot requests due to the COVID-19 virus.

It is my opinion and belief, that our current laws are sufficient to allow the registered voters of Arkansas the choice of going to their local polling location or requesting an absentee ballot from their local County Clerk. We are fortunate that our lawmakers had the foresight in crafting our election laws to allow for times of being unavoidably absent whether by natural disaster, war, or global pandemic.

Mask small sacrifice for sake of others

To the editor:
"Knowledge is power."
A quotation attributed to Francis Bacon (1597) and quoted by Thomas Jefferson in correspondence in at least four instances. It is a phrase that has stuck with me for as long as I can remember and one I truly believe in.

I have been watching the news more closely since the COVID-19 outbreak in the US, as I imagine many of you have. I find it utterly astonishing how self-absorbed so many people are. I have seen it in interviews and on Facebook. I am not talking about those that think being told to wear a mask is a direct attack on their personal freedoms. That is a whole different rant. I am talking about those that attest that they are young, athletic, healthy and will not be severely impacted from COVID-19 should they contract it. Others are confused about what protections face masks offer.

The fact is that COVID-19 is extremely easily transmitted from one person to another in close proximity to each other and *without* barriers, such as face masks. The fact is that a person infected with COVID-19 can be contagious for up to 14 days without even knowing they have it. Another fact is that wearing a mask does not keep you from contracting COVID-19, but it keeps you from giving it to others should you have it and be unaware.

This is not the first deadly, contagious disease that ever happened. Smallpox, yellow fever, cholera, scarlet fever and typhoid come to mind.

Unlike those that have come before, we are in the age of technology, where we can communicate instantly via messenger, email, cell phone, text message, Instagram, FaceTime and Zoom. Sure, we must go to the store, but it isn't like we are totally isolated should we self-quarantine. We have Netflix, DVDs, TV, video games, Alexa and computers to entertain us. We can communicate with anyone we want without having to leave our homes. What a luxury! Yet people are still gathering for whatever reasons, many without a mask.

In a region where people are proud to be church going folks, how are you not concerned about passing along COVID-19 to your fellow "man"? Sure, people you encounter may look healthy, but they could easily be in a high-risk group due to any number of things. If they are not in a high-risk group, what about those they could potentially take COVID-19 home to? Infants, elderly, cancer patients, immune compromised, etc.? Do you have a grandmother? A grandfather? A new niece or nephew? How about a child or sibling with cancer? How could you live with yourself if you were the reason that they contracted COVID-19 and wound up on a respirator struggling to breathe or worse?

It does not matter how healthy or young you are. This strikes with serious complications randomly, and even if it did not, do you want to be the next Typhoid Mary? Wear a mask and social distance for the sake of your fellow man, woman and child, and be thankful we have technology and aren't stuck in a two-room home with no electricity or running water with only a book to keep us company.

Governor using 'carrot and stick'

He does not share his innermost feelings, and he's not an innermost feelings kind of guy anyway. But if he did share them, he'd probably say he's as tired of answering why the state doesn't have a mask mandate as he was when he was constantly asked why he hadn't issued a stay-at-home order.

The reasons for both are similar. The governor has exercised extraordinary power over Arkansans' lives these past three months. But governments always depend on the consent of the governed, and the governed eventually will revolt if pushed too far. Here in Arkansas, Hutchinson will see increased defiance by the people that would be reflected in a more defiant Legislature. The latter already is happening as he nears the second half of his last term. It would have happened anyway, but the pandemic likely accelerated it.

The governor has said a mask mandate could backfire and result in fewer masks being worn by assertively independent Arkansans. Moreover, it would be unenforceable. Are police supposed to cite or arrest people for not wearing a mask?

Instead, he has opted for actions he can enforce, like shutting down schools for almost half a million students and requiring state-licensed restaurants to require masks.

Now he's added a carrot-and-stick approach – the carrot being football, the stick being no football. We

still don't know when the next kickoff will be. Across Arkansas, high school players are practicing, but it's supposed to be non-contact and they're supposed to be wearing masks where appropriate, which I have a hard time believing is happening everywhere. Meanwhile, we're all waiting to see if college football actually happens this fall as programs like LSU and Clemson report large numbers of infected athletes.

Meanwhile, the governor is setting an example by wearing a mask in public alongside his Secretary of Health Dr. Nate Smith. He injected a little humor into his efforts June 30 by displaying an internet meme featuring the presidents on Mount Rushmore wearing digitally imposed masks.

It's good that he's setting an example, but I don't know how many Arkansans will wear a mask because they saw a current politician or a dead president wearing one. Sen. Greg Leding, D-Fayetteville, suggested on his Twitter feed producing a public service announcement featuring nurses describing their hospital experiences and asking Arkansans to wear masks. That would be a better way for the governor to spread his message, and with state revenues coming in higher than expected, he has the money to do it.

The governor says wearing a mask is a key part of social distancing that will reduce the virus's spread and allow the state to fully reopen its

economy. The evidence has demonstrated that wearing a mask helps contain the respiratory droplets that can carry the disease. Mask-wearing is widespread in South Korea. That country has seen only 282 deaths from COVID-19, according to the online resource Worldometer, compared to the 127,000 people in the United States who have died of or with the disease. Granted, South Korea is doing a lot of things the United States wouldn't do, but it also didn't shut down its economy to the extent we did.

The number of deaths nationally here has fallen significantly off its April peak, even as the caseload has been rising in some states including Arkansas. Maybe as a country we're through the worst of this thing, or maybe we're just in a lull. We still have much to learn as we combat a new virus that can change.

Here's what's clear: The governor has been willing to exercise his available powers while being mindful not to overreach, and he's warning that if things don't change, we might not have football this year.

In other words, this time the state's referee-in-chief is saying that not grabbing the face mask results in a penalty.

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Cartwright honored with scholarship endowment

Friends and employees of the University of Arkansas System Division of Agriculture honored outgoing Cooperative Extension Service director Rick Cartwright June 26 with a \$40,000 scholarship endowment created and named in honor of him and his wife, Lynette.

The Rick and Lynette Cartwright Scholarship Endowment will be managed by the Arkansas 4-H Foundation. Proceeds from the endowment will fund future college scholarships for members of 4-H, the youth development program managed by the Cooperative Extension Service.

A son of Bonnie and the late Ed Cartwright of Fifty Six, Rick grew up on a farm and was a member of 4-H. He graduated Mountain View High School in 1972 and soon moved away, only returning for visits.

"It was a great place to grow up," he told the *Leader* last week. "I still have fond memories of that experience."

Rick's brother Mike and great-uncle Dean Wallace pushed him to go to college. Wallace was an Extension forester at the time and

while he did not steer Rick specifically that direction, that's what happened.

"I didn't really think about it at the time, but ended up working at the same place."

Cartwright joined the University of Arkansas System Division of Agriculture in 1992, earning international recognition as a rice pathologist and serving in various leadership posts before being named interim director of extension in 2016 and director in 2017. His last day on the job was June 30.

"Dr. Cartwright leaves behind a long legacy of extension work. Research and education have been his life's work," Martha Ray

Sartor, associate vice president for family and consumer sciences and 4-H youth development, said. "We could not think of a more fitting way to honor him than to provide educational opportunities for others."

Cartwright announced his plans to retire last year. Over the months since, colleagues and friends quietly raised money for the scholarship endowment, keeping it a secret until his June 26 retirement celebration, said John Thomas, development officer for the Arkansas 4-H Foundation.

"Twenty-seven years ago, I accepted an offer to return from California and work again for the University of Arkansas System Division of Agriculture. It was an opportunity to put my plant pathology Ph.D. from UC Davis to work, to bring me back to my home state, and to work with the best people anywhere - you," Cartwright said in his retirement announcement. "I have never regretted that decision."

Cartwright was appointed director Aug. 1, 2017, after serving as interim associate vice president for agri-

culture-extension for the previous year. Cartwright had served in a number of roles both on the Extension and Agricultural Experiment Station sides. Moving into administration, Cartwright served as interim head of the plant pathology department, and then associate director-Agriculture and Natural Resources for extension.

"I was grateful to be a part of the very real and substantial transformation of our organization into a 21st century model," Cartwright said in the announcement. "Our work together has been a singular privilege."

Mark Cochran, vice president-agriculture for the University of Arkansas System and head of the Division of Agriculture, said Cartwright "has been an inspiration, a voice of reason and a staunch advocate for the role of extension in improving lives in Arkansas. It's an understatement that we will greatly miss him and his considerable leadership abilities."

Cartwright has been recognized with the John White Outstanding Extension State Faculty Award from the Division; the Distinguished Rice Research and Education Award from the Rice Technical Working Group; the Extension Excellence Team Award; the Outstanding Plant Pathologist Award from the Southern Division of the American Phytopathological Society; and the 2011 National Rice Industry Award.

He is married to Lynette Warren, and they have three children and four grandchildren.

When asked how he will spend retirement, he replied, "Working for my wife," noting that she has a list of things compiled over 44 years that should keep him busy.

The Arkansas 4-H Foundation is continuing to raise money for the Rick and Lynette Cartwright Scholarship Endowment, with the

goal of reaching \$50,000. In the past two years, the Arkansas 4-H Foundation has awarded more than \$115,000 in college scholarships, benefitting 91 youth.

We are once again accepting donated books! Please call the library prior to bringing books, and someone will meet you at the back door.


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Friends of the Library provides free books

dent and CEO. "Some consolidation to create a more efficient organization may take place; however, WRHS continues to provide the same comprehensive range of healthcare services to patients throughout northcentral Arkansas." "My heart goes out to the employees impacted by these changes," Paxson added. "These decisions were made after much thought, consideration of all alternatives, and prayer in the wake of the unprecedented impact of the COVID-19 pandemic. As difficult as these decisions are to make, it is demanded of us to make these decisions to continue our mission of caring for patients and our communities. WRHS, like many other businesses and healthcare systems, are taking similar actions during these challenging times."

A list of positions being eliminated was not available, Mace said, but she said WRHS has worked hard to minimize the impact on direct patient care positions.

Meanwhile, administrative staff are also being reduced or taking cuts in pay.

"We wanted to make sure people understood these reductions have happened all across the board in our facility. We didn't leave our leadership structure intact and lay off frontline employees," Mace said.

She also explained that patient care would not be jeopardized in the event of a surge in COVID cases in WRHS facilities.

"Our very first priority was to make sure we maintained the adequate level of bedside caregivers," she said.

"We have employees who are working reduced hours based on volume. We have employees who are furloughed. Some of those 90 positions were actually unfilled positions. So instead of leaving it on the books we eliminated the position," she explained.

us to reduce expenses. And unfortunately some expenses have increased."

This includes additional cleaning and disinfecting, personal protective equipment, and in some cases extra staff to conduct screening of patients and visitors.

Mace added that Stone County Medical Center is continuing will all elective care. Stone County clinics are also open and seeing patients, and WRHS has detailed plans for dealing with any mass casualty situation that might arise.

"We have plenty of capacity for people. We have plenty of bed space, and we also have plenty of employees," Mace said. "People should not be worried, and they also should not be delaying routine medical care, tests and treatments. We don't want anyone to have an adverse medical consequence because they're afraid to come to the hospital."

Mace said the increase

in COVID testing volume has, unfortunately, created a backlog and slowed down the process, with it now taking 5 to 10 days for many people to receive results.

"One of the messages we would really like to give the public is if you felt the need for a coronavirus test and you were tested, you should isolate, protect yourself and protect your family until you get your results. If you feel like you've been exposed and have been tested, you should really isolate yourself."

WRHS has also announced a recent change to its visitation policy, including at SCMC. Patients are now allowed one visitor between the hours of 4 and 6 p.m.

"We know that has been a significant hardship on folks. Our part of Arkansas has done very, very well with keeping case counts low. We just want to keep it that way."

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

Meat processing still down but rebounding

Meat processing continued at a lower level through May, according to the National Agricultural Statistics Service (NASS), but it wasn't because of COVID-19-related closures.

NASS, part of the U.S. Department of Agriculture, issued its monthly "Poultry Slaughter" and "Livestock Slaughter," updating production data through the end of May.

"In May, chicken slaughter held up much better than might have been expected, given the disruptions in processing operations that received so much attention," said John Anderson, head of the agricultural economics and agribusiness department of the University of Arkansas System Division of Agriculture and the Dale Bumpers College of Agricultural Food and Life Sciences. Anderson said chicken

slaughter was down 9 percent over May 2019 and down 3 percent compared to April.

"Most of the decline is actually due to the fact that May 2020 had two fewer slaughter days than May 2019, and one less than last month," he said. The number of processing days is determined by when week-ends or holidays fall during the month.

Cattle and hog slaughter were down "markedly from a year ago, even accounting for fewer slaughter days. May 2020 cattle slaughter was 23 percent lower than May 2019, and May 2020 hog slaughter was 17 percent lower than May 2019," Anderson said.

However, when compared to April 2020, beef processing made a slight rebound. "Cattle slaughter fell more sharply than hog slaughter but stabilized more quickly,"

he said.

Anderson said that the weekly data suggest that "by the time June is wrapped up, cattle and hog slaughter will likely both within 5 percent or less of the prior year."

Consumer demand for meat has caused frozen meat supplies to decline

from April and from May 2019.

"Stocks of frozen pork in cold storage declined by 24 percent from April and are 26 percent lower than a year ago," he said, adding that pork stocks are at their lowest level since August 2011.

Anderson said frozen stocks of beef and chicken both remained above 2019 levels, despite a decline from April to May.


