# New agent feels suited for county

Although she is new to the job of a county Extension agent, Katie Frizzell believes she will be well suited as family and consumer sciences agent in Stone County. She has always wished for a career where she could help people, and she has also been drawn to Mountain View.

Katie and her family visited Mountain View for the first time when she was 11. Her father had taken family vacations here as a child and wanted to share the place with his own family, she said.

"I fell in love with it at a very young age. I always told my parents I'm gonna live in Mountain View. I love it here.'

Originally from Star City in Lincoln County, Katie grew up on a farm where her family raised crops including soybeans and corn. Her family has been farming for generations.

"Dad always said he didn't have two daughters. He had two kids. He raised us to work hard, and my sister and I grew up working outside and getting dirty. ... We grew up to be flexible."



Wow, I commend you on keeping your mom home and caring for her. It is a full time job. The good news for you is that there are a numbe

First, there are home care agencies that will come to your house and let you take a break. These agencies generally charge between \$17 and \$20 per hour. If you do a 24 hour continual care for a day or so, they will usually cut the rate. Doing this will let you get away for some time to just "be away" all the way up a weekend away where you can really relax. To help pay for this, Alzheimer's Arkansas gives grants for respite care. This money is available to anyone with a dementia diagnosis, not just Alzheimer's Disease. They can be reached at 1-800-689-6090. Another option, is adult daycare. Here, for much less money per hour, a person can go and be cared for, fed and entertained for a day You will have to arrange to drop them off and pick them up within certain time periods; however, for a day of peace and quiet, this is a grea

What if you just want a "staycation" (a vacation where you stay at home)? Then, most nursing homes offer respite care. They will generall require a minimum number of days since there is a fair amount of paperwork involved; however, say for 5 days or so, you can put your loved one there, they will be well-cared for, and you can stay at home. You will have to pay the daily private pay rate but considering the prices of hotels and travel, it might just make sense to use this option. I hope this helps

#### NOTICE OF PUBLIC HEARING ON APPLICATION FOR COMMUNITY **DEVELOPMENT BLOCK GRANT PROGRAM**

A public hearing will be held on Thursday, February 16, 2017, at 5:00 p.m. at the Stone County Courthouse Courtroom, 107 West Main, Mountain View, for the purpose of identifying and prioritizing the community needs of Stone County, determining whether an application for Arkansas Community and Economic Development Program (ACEDP) funds should be developed and if so, for what community need. Also, comments on proposed project activities will be discussed, especially those with possible impacts on the community, should the project receive funding.

ACEDP funds are federal assistance received by the State of Arkansas and administered by the Arkansas Economic Development Commission. These funds will be made available to cities and counties according to need and can be used for housing rehabilitation, community facilities, or economic development, but must address one of the fol lowing objectives:

- 1. Provide benefit to low and moderate income families,
- 2. Aid in the prevention of slum and blight, or
- 3. Meet other community needs, which pose a serious, immediate threat to the health or welfare of the community where no other funding is available to meet such needs.

All residents of Stone County are encouraged to attend the hearing and participate in the community development process. Stone County will provide technical assistance in developing proposals by groups representing low- and moderate-income persons.

# 50-year-old law still facing challenges

This month we observe the 50th anniversary of the state's "Sunshine Law," a significant piece of legislation that changed the way public officials do business, forcing them to discuss and decide matters in the open and within the public view rather than in private sessions as had been common prac-

Information Act

1967 - 2017

The day the sun shone in was Feb. 14, 1967, when then Gov. Winthrop Rockefeller signed the Arkansas Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) into law. It has since been deemed one of the strongest Sunshine Laws in the country and it is the envy of many states – states that adopted similar

laws only to have them amended so heavily that they no longer served their intended purpose.

The Arkansas FOIA has been amended only 23 times to offer exemptions for things such as grand jury minutes, child adoption records, prison blueprints, and other reasons that can be easily justified. Only 23 times in 50 years, but it's not for lack of trying.

The FOIA anniversary falls during a legislative session in which lawmakers once again are attempting to close the shades against that bright sunshine. During every legislative session, our state press association leads the effort to monitor proposed bills as they are presented in Little Rock and lobby against those that are unreasonable efforts to weaken the law.

Bills in the current session include one to withhold accident reports for 30 days; one to create an FOIA exemption for school security plans and records; and one to create an exemption for police dash cameras and body-worn cameras.

State Sen. Missy Irvin of Mountain View was listed as a co-sponsor of HB 1403 regarding accident reports. Information from her and APA reps indicates the bill has been deferred by its lead sponsor, Rep. Justin Boyd of Fort Smith, who was trying to address situations in which people pull names of accident victims and then use deception and harassing tactics to urge them to seek certain treatments. Irvin assures us that the bill will not be re-introduced without an amendment to retain media access, an offer Boyd had made to APA representatives who lobbied against the bill.

However, the APA will never seek to obtain privileges for newspapers beyond what are afforded to the general public regarding freedom of information. We represent the public and the people's right to know, and we don't want special access to meetings or information beyond what is afforded to the general public. We want to defend the FOIA's legislative intent: "That the public's business be conducted in public, and that the records of government be open and accessible to the People of Arkansas."

It's really pretty simple.

There are usually other ways to solve the problem of people misusing public information without creating FOIA exemptions.

The old days of routine closed-door meetings in smoke-filled rooms are gone, and we take for granted the tenets of open government. In general, we don't have to worry that significant actions are being taken in secret. But we must remember that is entirely the result of the FOIA that Rockefeller championed. Without the FOIA, Arkansas residents would remain in the dark about many actions of public officials at every level – from state government down to city and county, school boards and public agencies.

We expect our legislators and other public officials to put on their sunglasses and enjoy the sunshine. It has been the public's right for the past 50 years and we will not be forced back into the dark.

# **COW MOUNTAIN ECONOMIST**

# 'Jawboning' popular but risky

President Trump did it again. He was jawboning. He had called in the leaders from some of the big pharmaceutical companies. It was his usual carrot and stick approach to economic issues. He wanted lower drug prices and fewer imports (currently about 40% of all drugs are imported). In return he promised fewer regulations and quicker approval of new drugs.

Where does the term "jawboning" come from? There are several claims to its origins as a symbol for Presidential chastisement of industry to get something done. My sources seem to lead back to President Herbert Hoover in the early phases of the Great Depression. As the Depression spread in the early 1930s, Hoover implored industry to keep wages up, even as unemploy ment soared. To say that this jawboning was spectacularly unsuccessful is an understatement. Hoover lost the next election and his good reputation for the rest of his life.

President Trump started jawboning with the Carrier Company and its decision to move part of its production to Mexico. Trump seemed to achieve a partial success with that company. After that he moved on to the big defense contractors, the automobile companies, and the "tech" companies. In each case, the President wants more production (and employment) in the U.S. and promises fewer regulations as a payoff for compliance. And tariffs (taxes) on imported goods can also help back up jawboning, but tariffs are now entangled in a vast web of international agreements, so they are hard to change unilaterally.

Jawboning has had a glorious past, but it is certainly has not been a process that has been very successful in accomplishing concrete results. I remember jawbon-

ing from President Kennedy. He was really mad at the steel companies. The steel companies used a complex system to rig the market on a regional basis in the U.S. His battle with the steel companies filled the press, just like President Trump's current battles are doing. But President Kennedy really did not get permanent changes out of the industry. Jawboning does make for great press.

Jawboning is a popular political tool, but a risky long term gambit. While a U.S. President is very powerful, he really has little ability to enforce his economic threats. Industry usually reacts to incentives – new markets, new prices, and new places to make a profit. So a President has to be careful to jawbone where market is already going when assailıng certain companies. If you want automobile companies to build new factories in the U.S., it is wise to know that new automated factories in the U.S. make good economic sense. If you demand lower drug prices, it is good to know that several patented medicines will be going generic in the next year or so. And that is the conundrum that President Trump faces as a devotee of jawboning. It is an attempt to beat the market with moral suasion. And that tends to get business people mad over time.

But does jawboning really work? The consensus among economists is that it does not. A politician may be able to change the direction of one company, or may bring about temporary market changes. But the power of the marketplace and the corporate pursuit of profits are just too great to change if all the incentives are pointed another way.

Consumers usually vote with their dollars. They want goods that are high quality, available in large quantities, and at the lowest price. Where there is clear price gouging, for example in some prescription drugs, the President has a chance of changing things. But where there are clear advantages to outsourcing around the globe as is the case with automobiles, many consumer goods and all electronics, jawboning will sell politically but have no impact on employment, investment, or the domestic content of the final production of the goods.



cludes an insurance mandate for employers with 50 or more full-time (or full-time equivalent) employees, effectively barred stand-alone HRAs for small employers. But now the Cures Act permits stand-alone HRAs if the following conditions are met: • The employer has fewer than 50 employees and

- doesn't offer any other group health plan to emplovees • The plan is funded solely by employer contribu-
- Typically, HRAs must offer the same basic terms for all eligible employees.
- The maximum annual employer contribution is \$4,950 per year for an HRA covering just the employee and \$10,000 that also covers family mem-
- The plan must provide payment or reimbursement for qualified expenses. Documentation by employees is required.

Although the future of the Affordable Care Act is uncertain, it is expected that stand-alone HRAs for small employers will remain a viable option in the years to come. If interested, these new smaller employee HRAs may be offered beginning in 2017
