



Two candidates seek JP 1 seat

Two candidates will compete for Stone County justice of the peace in District 1.

Jim Bullard and Caroline Townsend Powell will face off in the Republican Primary May 24, for the JP seat currently held by Powell's father, Stan Townsend. He is not seeking re-election.

A Stone County native, Bullard has experience in public office, having served as constable for more than 20 years in both Blue Mountain and District 1.

He was prompted to run for JP because he wants to stand up for the county in the face of issues that could change our way of life.

Bullard commented that political deals are often made outside the office, but his will be done only at the table.

"I haven't made any deals to get there, and I won't make any political deals to stay there outside of the court. If I had to make deals outside of the court, I don't feel that I could serve you fairly," he said.

"You District 1 voters can count on me to always have your interest at heart, and I will never vote for changes without your voices being heard."

Bullard grew up in the Timbo community and attended Timbo School. He is an ordained minister and has pastored different churches. He is still in the ministry, and he and his wife, Frances, are members of the Bethany Missionary Landmark Baptist Church in Onia.

He currently owns and operates Jim's Equipment Sales and has had numerous successful business endeavors, an experience that he feels will serve him well as JP.

"I feel like while dealing with so many people in an ethical and fair manner, my experiences will provide a better understanding while serving on the court," he said.

Bullard mentioned road maintenance and the drug epidemic as top issues of concern for the county government.

"I will work with the county judge and other quorum court members to support a strong road program that will benefit all people. Due to inflation, the cost of fuel and maintenance will need to be considered," he said.

"We have a growing epidemic of drugs, and I will support strong law enforcement and drug task forces while combatting the issues," he added.

Bullard said that while no one person can solve these issues, the elected officials need to work together with an open mind and bring logical solutions to the table.

"I intend to leave all political differences and prejudices at home, and I encourage the other members to do the same. If we all work together, there are no issues that we can't solve. I look forward to serving with the judge and other members of the court," he said.

Bullard said he has enjoyed meeting and talking to many wonderful people during his campaign, and he also thanks his opponent for staying positive.

"It has been an unforgettable experience. I humbly thank you for your support, and I look forward to representing you to the best of my ability," he said.

For Caroline Townsend Powell, this is her first experience in politics, but she felt the need to get involved because of several issues that need to be addressed in the coming years.

These include the new Stone County Jail, as well as the need to settle the issue of alcohol sales in

the county. "The completion of the new jail is a big priority," Powell said.

Organizers hope for clear skies

Mountain View Iris Festival organizer are hoping rainy weather will clear as predicted before the weekend, but they have contingency plans in place for Friday and Saturday, just in case.

Visitors are encouraged to visit the gazebo on the courtsquare, where a Welcome Center will have the latest updates on scheduling and locations. There will also be maps of the iris gardens for those who want to tour the blooms.

Carousel Organ Association members are planning to return to play the "Happiest Music on Earth" both days from about 10 a.m. to 4 p.m.

Friday and Saturday from 9 a.m. until 4 p.m. non-profit organizations from around the state are invited to participate in the iris festival. Several groups will

be on the courthouse lawn to provide gardening information, and the University of Arkansas Plant Health Clinic will test soil samples for those who want to bring them.

There will be music on the courthouse stage on Friday night with *Crazy Ray and Wolfjaw*, and a street dance on Saturday night with *Dixon Street*. Attendees are encouraged to bring lawn chairs for the two evenings of music.

On Saturday from 10 a.m. until noon, materials will be provided for youth to enjoy painting irises on canvas, along with other activities. Other artists are invited to show their iris-themed works on the courtsquare that day.

A car show featuring members of Team Corvette Posse will be Saturday 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. on the west side of the courthouse.

The Mountain View Iris Society will host the annual iris show and photo contest in the private dining room of Mi Pueblito restaurant on the east side of the courtsquare. Entries should be delivered to the room between 2 and 6:30 p.m. on Friday.

Flower show entries will be judged in five classes by judges from the American Iris Society, Region 22, on Saturday morning. See complete rules at <https://mountainviewirisfest.com/iris-show-mv-iris-society>.

The doors will be open to the public from noon to 4 p.m. for viewing of the iris entries.

Council debates aspects of city sanitation service

The Mountain View City Council continued their discussion of contracting with Waste Connections for sanitation services, but took no action on the matter at last Tuesday night's meeting.

Mayor Roger Gardner said he still hasn't received any pricing on what Waste Connections would pay the city for the city's sanitation equipment.

He said another unknown was if the quoted rate of \$14 per month from Waste Connections for residential trash pickup would be locked in place or what

the increases would consist of.

Gardner said the city just purchased \$20,000 worth of new dumpsters, and old ones would need to be scrapped and others repaired.

He stated the city also needs to see about getting a new sanitation truck, and the last quote he received was around \$185,000 to \$190,000.

He told the council it was very hard to find CDL drivers and it was getting harder to receive a CDL with the new regulations.

Gardner stated he knew if the city continued to operate sanitation services they would have control over it. He

said with contracting to another company the city wouldn't have much say.

Councilman J.K. Williams said he felt like the city needed to keep operating the sanitation services as long as possible.

Councilman Danny Simmons said the city can only subsidize sanitation for so long, and a rate increase should be considered, especially with the rise of tipping fees.

Councilman Finis Brewer said he had received two calls asking for the city to continue the sanitation service.

Gardner said the council decided to raise

rates, a \$2 increase would be needed to break even to cover the tipping fee increase and wouldn't cover the depreciation on equipment.

He said he didn't have a problem with giving back to the community though subsidizing sanitation.

Gardner said current residential trash pickup is \$11 a month.

The council took no action.

In other business, the council discussed upcoming projects within the city. Gardner told the council that plans and specs for the pool renovation project were completed and

were to be submitted to the state for approval.

Brewer said he would like to have a grand opening for the community to attend once the pool is completed.

The city also plans to move forward with renovating the tennis court with potential grant funding and funds from National Tennis Association.

The basketball court is also completed and ball-goals are to be installed next, Gardner told the council.

He also mentioned creating a space for pickleball and a skateboard park.

Also at the meeting, the council discussed at

length how they want the city to look good and what needs to happen next to enforce cleanup in certain areas of the city.

Williams said he had received several calls about property needing to be cleaned up on Highway 9 South.

Gardner said the planning and zoning officer had contacted the owners, but so far nothing had been cleaned. The council agreed to move forward with citations, and possibly cleaning up messes and putting a lien on property for the cost of cleanup.

Ben Bishop tops other All-Stars

Two Mountain View students competed for individual quiz bowl honors this year, with Ben Bishop winning first place in the Arkansas Governor's Quiz Bowl Association Senior High All-Star Tournament.

Because of their outstanding regional and state tournament play, senior Beau Turner and junior Bishop qualified for the All-Star Tournament held April 30 at Hendrix College in Conway.

The tournament field was composed of the top 48 players in the state, representing all classifications, each trying to claim the title of the state's top quiz bowl player.

Preliminary play was three rounds, with each round consisting of 70 tossup questions. Once a player answered 10 tossup questions correctly in a round they "maxed out" and were awarded 1st place in the room. The next player to get to 10 would be second, and so on, until all 70 questions in the round were asked. Players were then paired for the next round based on their finish.

Bishop "maxed out" first in rounds one and two, including a head-to-head matchup with teammate Turner. In round three Turner returned the favor by winning the room over Bishop and claimed the 2nd seed heading into afternoon play, with Bishop being 8th. After round five, the field was narrowed to 16 semifinalists with Bishop and Turner advancing.

In semifinal round six, Bishop again "maxed out" first, with Turner missing advancing to the finals by a single question.

Mountain View was one of two schools to place two players in the semifinals and the only public school (non-charter) to do so. Bishop was the only finals player from a public school below the 5A classification.

In the finals, Bishop and players from Little Rock Central, Lifeway Christian, Greenwood, Conway, Lake Hamilton, and Haas Hall-Bentonville battled for the title. Players were eliminated one at a time every 10 questions, with the lowest remaining scorer dropped from the field at each juncture. With three players remaining, all were tied with 10 correct tossups. Over the next 30 questions, Bishop pulled away to claim 1st place by three questions.

The council also voted to send a letter to the county judge and quorum court requesting political signs be removed from Service Street.

While the city had agreed to take ownership of the property from the county, the paperwork was never completed. Simmons said the lawyer's office that was doing the paperwork went out of business and the papers were now in storage.

Simmons said he believed it was disrespectful to place political signs in the iris beds after volunteers had worked so hard maintaining the area.

He told the council he had spoken with the county judge and was told the county couldn't legally remove the signs.

In other business the council:

- approved an invoice from SALT Engineers in the amount of \$13,259 for engineering services on the wastewater treatment plant rehab project.
- agreed to dispose of old computer equipment from the Mountain View Fire Department.
- approved financial reports.
- adopted Resolution 2022-03, approving the American Rescue Plan Act.
- heard from Gardner about several people planning to come to Mountain View for the total eclipse expected to take place in April of 2024. Mountain View is predicted to be an area that should turn completely dark, Gardner noted, and is going to be a perfect location for people to view the eclipse.
- discussed the issue of the bathroom door at the ball park being vandalized. City employees repaired the door to the best of their abilities. Gardner said the door was an unusual height, and they haven't been able to find a door to replace the damaged one. He said the bathroom paper dispensers are often ripped off the wall and smashed.

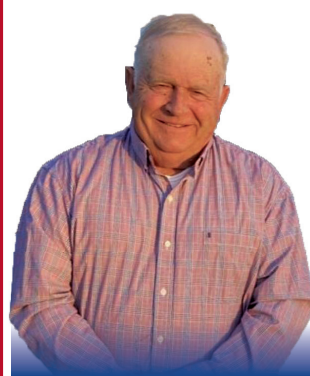

Gov. Asa Hutchinson goes house hunting

What's Asa Hutchinson planning to do after being evicted from the Governor's Mansion next year? He's going house hunting, and seeing if a big white one might be available.

The term-limited governor has been saying for a while that he's considering a presidential run, and now he's taking more specific steps to test the waters. In a press conference April 22, he said he will be traveling to various states over the next three to four months. He said each of the stops will have an economic benefit for Arkansas, but because he will be engaged in, hint-hint, other activities, the trips will be financed by his private political operation.

The governor's multi-state tour included a stop April 25 in New Hampshire, site of the first Republican presidential primary in 2024.

Speaking at the New Hampshire Institute of Politics at Saint Anselm College, the governor previewed what his campaign themes might be. He closed by referring to the model offered by President Reagan, who he described as a "consistent, common sense conservative" who was pragmatic and optimistic.

"We need problem solvers and not chaos creators," the governor earlier said.

Hutchinson touted his record in Arkansas during his seven years of office, which included tax cuts, his computer coding initiative, and keeping schools open during the pandemic. He noted that he recently had turned down \$146 million in rental assistance funds from the federal government. He didn't talk much about emotional, hot-button issues unless asked, and even then, his comments were restrained.

"I don't like the idea of passing bills in a cultural war so we can fire up our base," he said. "That, to me, is not the way I conduct politics."

The governor has appeared on national TV a lot the past few years because of his middle-of-the-road approach to covid and his willingness to criticize former President Trump. He has a national platform as chair of the National Governors Association.

He clearly does not want to retire. He is 71 years old,

but he certainly appears to be a healthy septuagenarian who has weathered the pandemic's stresses just fine. Besides, he's a young pup compared to Presidents Biden, 79, and Trump, 75 (not to mention Speaker Pelosi, 82).

If he runs, he'd be a long shot to win the Republican nomination, as would anyone not named Trump. If Trump runs, Hutchinson could position himself as the traditional Reagan Republican candidate in what might be a small field. If Trump doesn't run, Hutchinson could position himself as the same type of candidate in a huge field.

Hutchinson is not the only Arkansan interested in moving into a big white house. Sen. Tom Cotton has been appearing on national TV for years, and he's been no stranger to places like Iowa or New Hampshire.

Cotton more easily fits into today's click-driven political climate. He's combative, aggressive and uncompromising. He does not mind firing up the base.

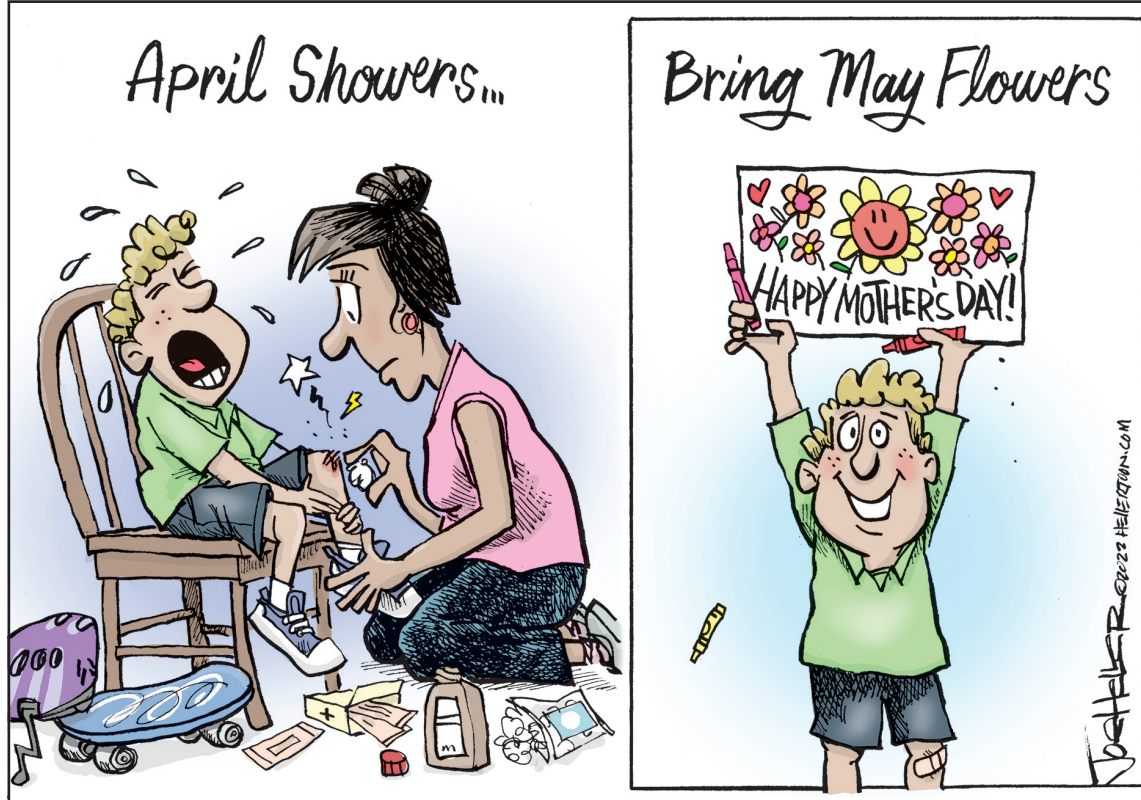
If you had to bet money on who will be president after 2024, your best odds would be to place it on Biden or Trump.

But you wouldn't want to bet your life on it because you never know what might happen in an election. Biden, after all, was no sure thing after having badly lost in his previous presidential runs. Many people didn't take Trump seriously at first. President Obama's star was rising fast in 2008, but it was supposed to be Hillary Clinton's year.

Sometimes a candidate just has to find a lane and stay there while the other candidates flame out or split their votes with each other. Eventually, a clear frontrunner emerges, and then he or she becomes the inevitable nominee.

That might be how Hutchinson, a Reagan Republican in a Trump era, can win. It's a long shot, but when you're house hunting, you might as well see if the one you really want is available.

Community: It's who we are

The online dictionary tells us that community is, basically, people with common interests living in a particular area. I think it is more than that. I witnessed true "community" first-hand once again at a recent event. Last Saturday I attended a fund-raising biscuits and gravy dinner and pie auction held at, and for, the old Luber School.

The one-room Luber School was built in the 1930s, just before the full effects of the Great Depression and a drought ruined the area's economy. It was part of President Franklin Roosevelt's Works Projects Administration (WPA). The building was listed on the National Register of Historic Places in 1992.

The event was very well attended. Many of the folks were from the Luber community, an unincorporated area south of Mountain View in Stone County, Arkansas. This is the community where my dad was born and raised, and he and his brothers attended classes in the old school (until they had to give up on education to go work to help support the family).

It appears there are only about three people still alive that attended the school, and at least one of them was in attendance. This is election time for local counties, so candidates for various offices came to share a bit about themselves and, of course, to bid on the pies, cakes and other items offered at the auction. There was a nice spread of homemade biscuits and lots of gravy for those who came hungry. I even tried something I had never even heard of - grape gravy. It was very tasty, and right there among the flour gravies with sausage or burger. There were also a couple of pots of chocolate gravy (don't knock it until you've tried it, my friends).

By all reports, the event was a great success in spite of the current economic

climate. The funds raised, through the auction and via a donation jar, will be used for further restoration and upkeep on the old school house, which now serves as a community building and is a great source of pride for the good folks of Luber, and for those of us who have familial connections to its history as well.

Pies, politicians, and biscuits and gravy aside, I was amazed at how the community came together to support this event. I watched as people talked and visited with one another. Many were forced to do their visiting outdoors because of the size of the crowd. The candidates all seemed to get along. There was no mud-slinging or finger-pointing. And the items up for bid - cookies, pies, cobblers, a few tomato plants, and even a hand-made, hand-stitched quilt - all brought good prices "for the cause" as it were.

I watched as the last few attendees made their way out into the last light of a fine spring day, and I was well-pleased with what I saw. Folks were still just standing around talking and laughing and, as dad would have said, "carrying on." There was a true sense of community that enveloped the event. Maybe folks were just glad to be once again free to mingle with their neighbors. Or maybe they were just happy

to be part of the ongoing history of the Luber School.

Whatever it was, I was pleased to be a part of it and to be representing my dad. I know beyond a shadow of a doubt he would have loved to have been there. He was part of that community. And during all those years he lived in the Kansas City area, working and raising his family, the Luber community remained a part of him as well.

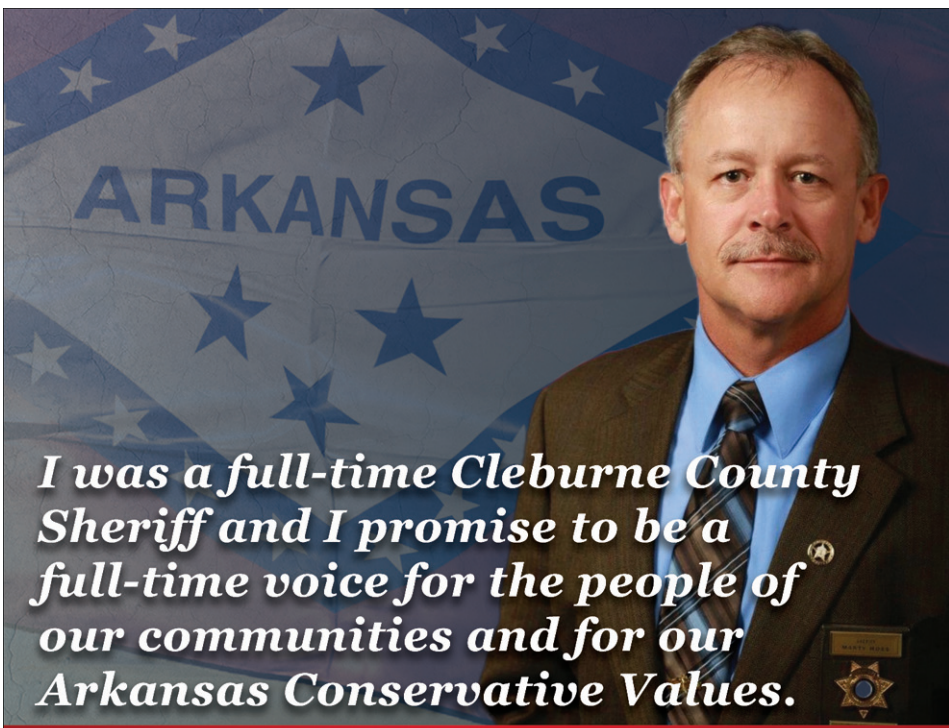

people are looking for a reason to celebrate, and we want our community members to enjoy Cinco De Mayo, but we also want to impress upon everyone the importance of planning ahead for a sober driver and get home alive," said Sheriff Lance Bonds and Chief George Bethell "If you've been drinking, make the right choice to find a sober driver to get you and your friends home safely. Before you put your keys in the ignition, remind yourself, either Diver Sober or Get Pulled Over."

According to NHTSA, 10,142 people were killed in drunk-driving crashes in 2019. On average, more than 10,000 people were killed each year from 2015 to 2019 — one person was killed in a drunk-driving crash every 52 minutes in 2019. This is why Stone County Sheriff's Office



and Mountain View Police Department is working with NHTSA to remind drivers that drunk driving is not only illegal, it is a matter of life and death. As you head out to the festivities, help us spread the word: Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over.

Drivers should also keep an eye out for

pedestrians who have had too much to drink. Walking while intoxicated can also be deadly, as lack of attention to their surroundings could put pedestrians at risk of getting hit by a vehicle.

"Drunk drivers are a continuing problem on our nation's roads, especially around days like

Cinco De Mayo," said Sheriff Lance Bonds and Chief George Bethell. "People need to know that they can go out for a night of fun and return home safely by planning ahead to ensure they have a sober driver take them home. Don't be the reason someone — including yourself — doesn't get home. Don't let Cinco De Mayo become an anniversary of a tragic night."

If you're the designated driver, make sure you don't drink so you can keep that promise of safety to yourself and your passengers. It can be a long night, but people are counting on you, not to mention the other drivers, passengers, and pedestrians on the streets. Take the role of designated driver seriously — people are relying on you.

Plan a Sober Ride Before ever heading

out, it's vital to plan ahead. Be honest with yourself: You know whether you'll be drinking or not. Follow these ideas to ensure you and your fellow partygoers live another day.

• Remember that it is never okay to drink and drive. Even if you've had only one alcoholic beverage, designate a sober driver or plan to use public transportation or a ride service to get home safely.

• If you see a drunk driver on the road, contact 870-269-3825.

• Do you have a friend who has been drinking and is about to drive? Take the keys away and make arrangements to get your friend home safely.

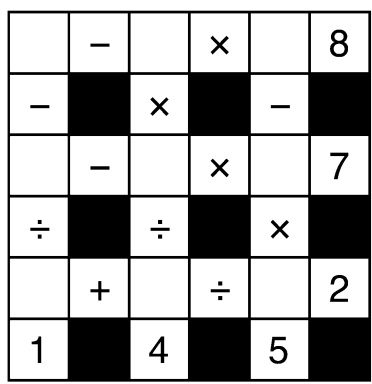
